Such as Turkey, growing depends upon final results and will be finished birds of good weight will

go a long way toward making the final result show a profit to the grower. That results are usually obtained by feeding a variety of grains, such as corn, wheat and ground barley. If the birds have been well fed up to this time, they may be safely fed all they will consume from now until killing time. Required technical, mystery and some well are required to provide for the proper home development. As turkeys are economical users of feed and bring higher prices per pound than other farm animals, the advantages of liberal feeding is apparent. In addition to the margin of profit that is possible to be made in the increased weight, that is added during the finishing process, another item of great importance is the increased value of the bird per pound, due to better finish. This often amounts to 10 cents per pound, which for a 15 pound turkey total \$1.50 per bird.

A SEASONABLE RECIPE

Mince Meat
2 pounds beef
1 pound suet
2 pounds apples
2 pounds raisins
2 pounds currants
1 pound citron
1/2 pound brown sugar
2 tablespoons molasses and mace.
Chop up each nutmeg, cloves, allspice, salt.
Fry the meat and run through a food chopper with the suet. Drain and cure the apples and chop very fine.
Wash the raisins and currants.
Add the other ingredients, using enough cider to make correct consistency and boil 2-3 hours. This is not to cook, steam and should be served, be stored very frequently. If carefully sealed will keep almost indefinitely.

COUNTY WILL HAVE 80 MILES SURFACED ROADS AT YEAR END

When this year's work shall have been completed, Union county will have 80 miles of surfaced macadam roads according to county road master, E. H. Morgan. In addition to this there are about 15 miles of road which have been graded ready for surfacing that process to be finished in the near future. Union county has, according to Mr. Morgan, 185 miles of road within its confines, designated as market roads and consequently according to his figures as given above, one half of the program, suggested with the designating of "market roads," has been carried out. While there have been many requests for roads which have had to go by unheeded because of failure of proposed bond issues and for all that, the program, suggested with the designating of "market roads," has been carried out. This year just about to close, so far as much active, outside road work is concerned, has seen much road work done, in fact work on market roads this year has already run up into such figures as \$18,000.27. This work includes the following items:

(1) Perhaps the biggest item was the surfacing of the last 1/4 miles of the lower Cove market road, which had been graded the year before. This has been completed and the verdict of those who have been traveling over it since its completion is that it is very good road and will be of untold benefit to those who live adjacent to it. A number of farmers are, themselves, laying gravel from their own premises to meet this completed road thus giving them a good outlet all through the winter.

(2) The county has finished grading the Cricket Flat cemetery road standard. This stretch of about 4 miles will be gravelled later.

(3) The 4 1/2 miles of new road, northwest of North Powder toward Clover creek has been fenced and 2-3 of the grading has been completed. The work of grading is still going on and it is expected that this will be finished yet this year.

(4) On the River road, south-west of North Powder, grading has been finished on about 2 1/2 miles. These are the designated market roads. In addition to them, however, a lot of surfacing has been done, which might be termed the "gravel projects" for in these instances the county and the individual property owners have equally met the cost of the improvement. Work of this character has been done as follows:

(1) One and one-half miles near Union toward Wilkerson.

(2) What is known as the "spiral road" near Elsiehart, from Miller's corner, a stretch of about four miles.

(3) About two miles all told, in the Cove vicinity, some pieces in

each direction from that town.

(4) Two miles near La Grande, and an additional mile and a half yet to be finished.

(5) A strip of a quarter mile from the Conley bridge to the market road.

(6) A 1/2 mile strip from Fishers to Kenna.

In addition to all of this, county workmen have finished the grading of 48 miles of general roads. This work, together with a part of the "50-50" projects are paid for from the funds which the county receives as its share of the state automobile license.

The cost of building the market roads is met by state funds from different sources which the county is supposed to match. Union county is doing a little better than that, however, and is raising some more than the amount which comes from the state. This year about \$27,000 was received from the state mill levy. About \$15,000 or \$16,000 was received as its share from automobile licenses.

Mrs. Charles Gump, chairman of this county for the annual sale of the Christmas seal for the National Tuberculosis association is getting ready to send out over the valley the quantities of the little stickers, which she is hoping may be very generously purchased by residents of the valley. Mrs. Gump appoints in each district, which in this instance means the smaller towns of the county, a sub-chairman, who is responsible for the sales in his or her community, but beyond that she is relying on the teachers of the different rural schools to assist in disposing of the little health seals.

Exactly 150,000 of the Christmas seals have been received by Mrs. Gump for the use of Union county citizens this year. Last year less than half this many or around \$500 worth were sold. In this amount about half were sold in the valley. Last year there was a slump of about \$100 in the total sales, due to a number of reasons, and the chairman is hoping that this deficit will be made up and more this year.

The sale does not actually begin until after Thanksgiving, but Mrs. Gump expects to have everything in readiness to begin as soon as the bell rings, and she is already asking the support and cooperation of all residents of the county.

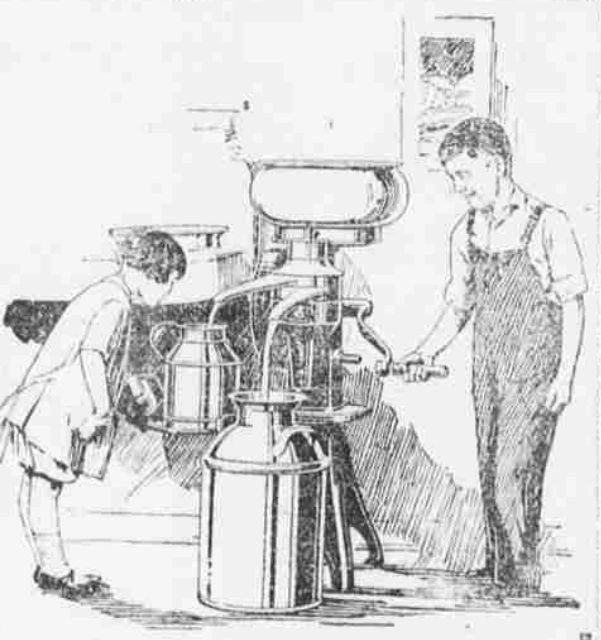
