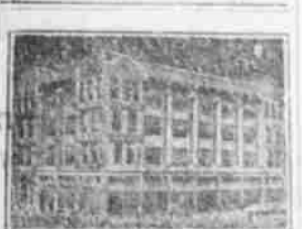

CO-OP SHIPPING IS SUCCESSFUL

Eight hundred fat hogs sent from Wallowa during the last month

By G. C. Meek (Observer's Correspondent) WALLOWA, Ore., (Special)—Much interest about farmers and small stockholders of this county is being manifested in the start in co-operative livestock shipping which was started a few weeks ago.

The shipments which have been made represent an average of something like 100 hogs a week. The shipments have been heavy from this section of the county during the past week, the freight of last week carried 22 cars of various classes of stock going to market.

Range and general forage conditions in this county are not up to those of the average fall this season, while some fairly heavy rains came during the month of September, the ground was so extremely dry that much of the pasture was dried up, giving the new grass a chance to get a start.

Present prospects point toward fairly good prices for farmers of this county who have hay for sale. Since hay is being delivered to peddlers in lower at this time, and the price paid for hay delivered is said to be about \$17 per ton.

Many local hunters have been taking advantage of the remaining open days for hunting quail (mountains in this county). Various reports are heard regarding the quail birds, but from the lack of hunters have experienced in getting birds, it would appear that the quail are not as plentiful this season as in years past.

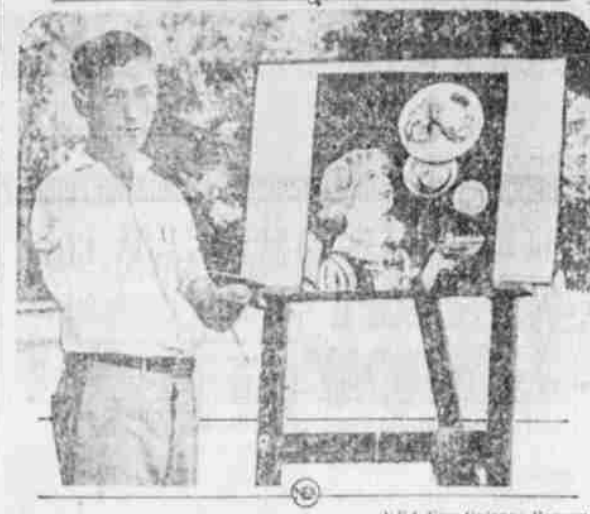

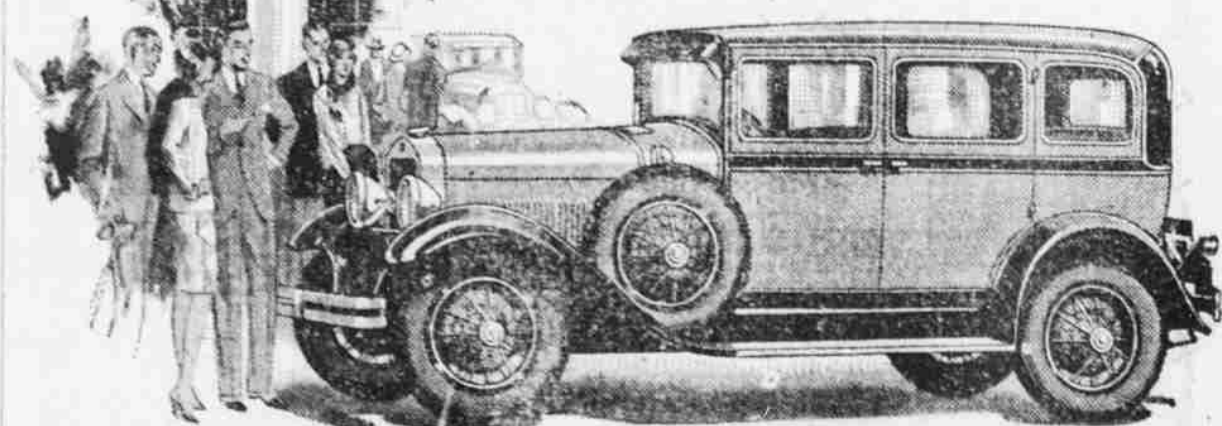
