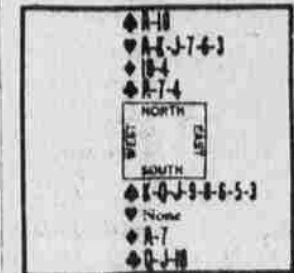

Bridge Pointers

Continuing the series of fifty Auction Bridge questions, we give today Deal W and questions No. 47. Deal W



South Declarer, score love-all. Spade contract. To the first trick, West leads the Nine of Clubs.

Questions No. 47. Which Club should Declarer play from Dummy on this trick?

Answer, Blank. 47. Declarer should play the Ace of Clubs to trick 1, from Dummy. (Will the blank before you read the answer that follows.)

The Answer. 47. Declarer should play the Ace of Clubs from Dummy on this trick. The lead of the Nine marks the King of Clubs in the East hand. West would not be apt to pick a King-high suit to lead against a suit declaration; but if he did so, he would lead the fourth best and not the second best which the Nine would be if West held the King. Failing to play the Ace of Clubs from Dummy will result in a ruff of the second round of Clubs which would happen if West's lead was a singleton. By winning the first trick in Dummy, the loss to the King of Clubs can be avoided because South can obtain two discards. South, however, needs a Grand Slam as he has one losing Diamond in addition to the two Clubs.

South can manage the hand so as to obtain the three discards without any difficulty unless the adverse Hearts or trumps are abnormally divided. He has two trump entries in Dummy; so with the adverse Hearts divided 4-3 and the adverse trumps 2-1, South can establish Dummy's long Hearts, get his three discards and make a Grand Slam.

MENUS

BREAKFAST—Grapes, cereal, cream, boiled lamb cutlets, bran muffins, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Tomatoe tomatoes with cheese, hearts of celery, peanut butter, bread, apple sauce, cookies, milk, tea.

DINNER—Ham baked in fresh sweet cider, marinated potatoes, creamed cauliflower, endive, grape pie, milk, coffee.

Any amount of ham, from a whole one to a slice, is delicious baked in sweet cider. Choose a slice cut two or three inches thick and parboil for 15 minutes before baking. Then rub with 1 tablespoon brown sugar, thoroughly mixed with 1/2 teaspoon mustard. Stick cloves into rim of fat and put meat in casserole or roaster. Pour over 1/2 cup sweet cider and bake 1 1/2 hours in a slow oven. Watch closely for the last half hour as the brown sugar and cider mixture will burn easily when reduced.

Tomatoe Tomatoes With Cheese. Four tomatoes, 1/2 tablespoon sugar, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 tablespoon minced onion, 1/2 cup dried celery, 6 tablespoons minute tapioca, 1/2 pound American cream cheese, 4 tablespoons buttered crumbs.

Feed and chop tomatoes. Combine with celery and onion and simmer for 20 minutes. Add sugar, salt, pepper and butter. Stir in tapioca and when mixture thickens cook over hot water until clear. Put a layer of tomato mixture into a well buttered baking dish. Add a layer of finely chopped
