Mrs. Palmer says, "One of the most wonderful speeches I ever heard was made by a French soldier who during the war lost both eyes. He talked on war, its after effects and the possibility of the world. He seemed hopeful that with proper living by the individuals who compose the nations of the world, it can become an institution of the past. General Pershing and Lady Churchill, of England, were two others of the distinguished visitors at the convention. Mrs. Palmer said, Mrs. Elchick, of Georgia, was elected national president of the auxiliary and Mrs. Boyd, of Arizona, was named western vice president. There were 20,000 delegates to the convention proper, 115 of whom were Oregonians who journeyed to Texas in the special train which, by the time it reached its destination, consisted of 15 coaches and six engines. It traveled through Washington, Idaho, Nebraska, Colorado, Wyoming and South Dakota on the way there gathering passengers as it went. The Salem corps was awarded second place in the nation and the Portland corps was designated national official corps for the 46-5. Mrs. Palmer said, "On the way to Texas the headquarters stopped for a half day in Dallas, Tex., four hours in Denver where the drum corps played and an hour in Butte, Mont., where the men and women were entertained royally and were given souvenirs. ## MOUNTED MEN TO HELP FIGHT 'FROST BATTLE'

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 31 (AP)—Mounted "police" who will speed their motorcycles through the orchard-growing sections of Southern California at night, seeking frost, not criminals, will unite this year with the citrus belt's worst enemy.

Plans for the drive against the frost danger were announced today by Floyd D. Young, government meteorologist in charge of the frost forecast service for Southern California at Pomona.

Taking every precaution against an early advance of frost, Young said that a nightly radio broadcast service would be established beginning with November 1 to advise growers of probable low temperatures.

The janitor found Miss Knaak standing up, her face and body blackened by the fire. Her forearms were burned to the bone, her hair was burned from her head, and the heat had seared the flesh on her forehead through to the skull. She was leaning against a pile by the furnace when the janitor saw her, and the sight sent him running upstairs, screaming for help.

Miss Knaak today stuck to her story that she had burned herself, despite much doubt concerning it by the authorities.

George Hargreaves, private detective employed by Lake county, visited the girl at the hospital where she appeared rational today.

Hargreaves said she told him she went to the village hall and entered by a back door but did not know why she had gone there. After she entered, she said she had the idea of burning herself.

Dr. A. J. Hensinger, Lake bluff, the girl's physician, expressed the opinion today that Miss Knaak probably would die from her injuries.
