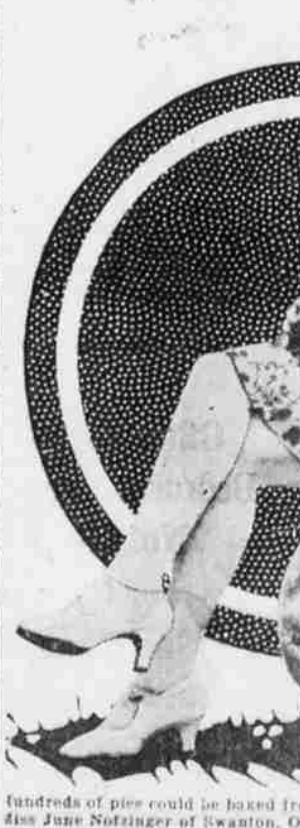

## Bridge Pointers

Continuing the series of fifty bridge queries today we give Deal X and question No. 44.

DEAL X.

♠	7-3
♥	8
♦	K-Q-10-9-7-6
♣	Q-J-10-9
NORTH	
SOUTH	
♠	A-Q-5-2
♥	A-Q-7-6
♦	J-5
♣	A-6-2

South Declarer, contract No. Trump, seven love-all.

To the first trick West leads the four of clubs. Dummy plays the nine of clubs, and East the five of clubs.

QUESTION NO. 44. Which club should Declarer play from closed hand?

ANSWER BLANK.

44. Declarer should play of clubs from closed hand. (Full the blank before you read the answer that follows.)

THE ANSWER.

44. Declarer should play the Ace of clubs.

Declarer is sure of at least one trick in each of three suits, Spades, Hearts and Diamonds, and two clubs. He also may make an extra trick in both Spades and Hearts, but to make sure he must establish and run Dummy's Diamonds.

With the Diamonds exposed in Dummy, the adversary who has the Ace will not play it until he has to; so it is essential that the Dummy hand have an entry which must be made in the club suit. If South should play a small club on trick 1 and establish Dummy's Diamonds, West would not lead an Ace of clubs; but if closed hand with the first trick with the Ace of clubs, immediately lead Diamonds and continue that suit until the adverse Ace is disclosed, he can get back into Dummy later via the club suit to cash Dummy's remaining Diamonds.
