Dr. Richardson Tells Of Mayo Brothers Clinic

With many interesting tales to recount, the material for which he gleaned from his five weeks' work at two world famous hospitals, Dr. A. L. Richardson, La Grande physician and surgeon, returned to the city yesterday.

At the Mayo Brothers' clinic in Rochester, Minn., Dr. Richardson came in contact with surgeons from all over the world. There were 200 doctors there, like himself, to take post graduate work.

"Patients were there from all over the world, from France, Norway and Sweden. One day I was there 600 people passed through the clinic," he said.

Observation of the types of diseases given the patients at the clinic illustrates the trend of modern medicine which is placing emphasis on preventative medicine. Dr. Richardson said, "This is shown by the fact that no more than an average of 150 out of every 600 people coming there for treatment are operated on. Fifty per cent are sent back to their homes with instructions for treatment by the home physician and about 25 per cent are pronounced incurable."

Few children are brought to the clinic. The most common ages are between 25 to 35 years. An average of about 1,000 operations a month are performed there. Dr. Richardson stated:

"The Mayo Brothers' establishment includes five hospitals. St. Mary's has a capacity of 600 beds, the Colonial has 400 and the Worcester has 200. The smaller hospitals include the Curie and the Kahler each with about 150 beds."

Dr. Richardson told about the new clinic building which will be ready for occupancy the first of the year. The structure is of 15 stories and has been erected at a cost of three million dollars. It covers a quarter of a block and includes in its design every facility known to modern medical equipment.

Dr. Richardson also spent two weeks in the surgery with Dr. Percy, famous physician of general surgery at Augustana hospital in Chicago. As many as 20 operations a day were performed by one doctor there, he said.
