Schaefer is taking no chances, he said, and will start his best outfit in the game. Maple, Sherwood and Thompson will be in the backfield, with much the same line as last week. It is possible that McKelip will be substituted for Whitlock at end, and Behell may go in at tackle in place of Stout.

OREGON SQUAD EN ROUTE
 EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 2 (AP)—Thirty players and three coaches left the University of Oregon here yesterday for Berkeley, Cal., where the Oregonians will meet the University of California football team tomorrow. The squad departed amid the noise of a hilarious student rally staged by the University students. Much of the good humor evinced by the team as it left for its third conference start this year was due to news that the Berkeley field was a bit wet from recent rains. The Oregon field has been sunny for several days, and Oregon believes the grid at Berkeley will be little different from the home field.

Only three workouts were held in the Oregon camp this week, although another light session of exercise is scheduled before the game. The three drills were devoted largely to punting and passing with a little touch football thrown in.

Defense Changed
 A change in Oregon's defense on punt formation plays was the only extensive alteration in the Web-foot repertoire in preparation for the California game. The passes upon which the team drilled for three days were those used against Washington, with but minor variations.

Before leaving Eugene, Captain John J. McKelip, Oregon coach, indicated he would use about the same lineup in California that he used in the Washington game. George Huddiman, center, and one of the linemen of the line, were not in uniform for the last practice session, but he was on the team and will be used. He injured a bad ankle sprain two weeks ago and did not respond readily to treatment.

The starting lineup will probably include Pope and Archer at ends; Huggins and Colbert at tackles; Huggins and Shields at guards; Huddiman, center; Gould, quarterback; Williams and Burnett, halves; Ostrander, full.

New York U And Georgetown Will Meet Tomorrow

NEW YORK, Nov. 2 (AP)—Football prognosticators were especially timid today about the Georgetown-New York University contest at the Yankee stadium tomorrow. Experts incline in the general direction of N. Y. U., but there is no attempt on the part of any to discount the strength of the invading Washingtonians. Both teams are undefeated and untied. N. Y. Penn State meets Notre Dame at Philadelphia in the only outstanding intercollegiate game scheduled in the east. Army and Colgate should have no too much trouble disposing of Depue and Washburn. Bear stories have been prevalent all week at Yale and Dartmouth camps. If all the injured fall to get into the game at New Haven it will look like a battle between a third-string Yale eleven and Dartmouth's fourth-string.

Aside from the Lafayette-W. and J. game at Boston, and Brown's clash with Holy Cross at Providence, the rest of the east's big-time teams are meeting opposition now rated as minor. Harvard takes on Lehigh; Navy meets West Virginia Wesleyan and Boston college tackles Manhattan.
