ROBINSON IN OHIO
SEN. ROBERT W. ROBINSON, D-IND., Nov. 2 (AP)—Completely satisfied with the results of a five speech tour of Indiana, Senator Joe T. Robinson today checked off the last state but one of his coast to coast campaign when he entered Ohio for speeches in Lima and Dayton. The democratic vice presidential nominee closed his campaign in Indiana last night in Fort Wayne.

The senator shared the views of a number of democratic leaders who traveled with him during the Indiana tour that the state should be placed in the doubtful column. The party workers told him that Frank C. Bailey was making a strong case as democratic nominee for governor on a platform calling for a house cleaning of state politics, and that his strength might have some effect on the democratic national ticket.

INJURIES FATAL TO MISS KNAAK, SELF TORTURER

every turn of the investigation, when officers tried to obtain a plausible explanation, they were forced back to the girl's own story of self-immolation.

An examination was made of books studied as a psychology student in Hutchins' class. One of them said: "Pain is merely fear or suggestion working on your conscious mind. If you will deny this belief to your subconscious mind will speedily make this denial good."
