Bridge Pointers

CONTRACT BRIDGE
We will continue today our illustrations of some of the variations which a score may make in the bidding of Contract Bridge. We are giving the hands of South (dealer) and North (Club hand) and suggesting that East and West pass whenever it is their respective turns to declare.

TODAY'S HAND

♠ K-Q-6
♥ J-10-6-5
♦ J-4-2
♣ 6-3

NORTH
SOUTH

♠ A-5

THE BIDDING
South would bid two Diamonds. With a love score, an original bid of two Diamonds in a convention which introduces a strong Major two-suit and asks partner to indicate a preference but with a score of 50 or less, or of 90, two of a Minor is exactly a game-losing bid and the two-suit convention is not used. Then, two of a Minor bid means: "I want to try for game with this suit the trump." With the above hand at a love score, South probably would have a better chance for game at No Trump than at Diamonds; but needing only two tricks to reach the goal, it would be foolish to risk the possibility of having the adversaries run six Clubs and save game.

After South's two Diamonds, North passes. North has a hand with which at a love score he would have been glad to bid Hearts over his partner's one Diamond or one No Trump; but he does not need to do so with a game bid in Diamonds because his assistance is simply sufficient to assure the Diamond game for his partner, even if South does not produce the entire eight tricks in his own hand. North consequently passes, being influenced to do so solely by the state of the score.
