Arrange Smoker For Opening Of Williams' Arena

The first weekly smoker to be staged in Phil Williams' efferent arena boxing arena is scheduled for Monday night, beginning at 8 o'clock sharp. Last evening Mr. Williams met with the boxing commission, explained his plans for developing boxing in La Grande, which were approved.

The plan is to give weekly smokers consisting of five four-round bouts at popular prices, largely designed to furnish both entertainment for the fans and to give them a glimpse on the possibilities of the fighters.

The ten fighters who will take part in Monday's smoker follow: Dell Allen, Bobby Steele, Kid Alabama, Hector Worlen, Kid Meacham, Young White, Bud Woodfin, Buck Anderson, Steamboat Jackson and Ted Allen.

Matching of these boys will be determined on both weight and ability and this will be announced Monday.

Mr. Williams' arena is designed to accommodate 500 fans and later on will be extended to take care of a larger number. A regulation ring has been put up and showers and equipment installed.

Mr. Williams, in addition to the smokers, will stage two regular boxing cards monthly, the first to be held Armistice day.

Eight Injured When Transport Plane Crashes

None Seriously Hurt—Smash-Up Follows Battle With Storm in North California

CHICO, Cal., Nov. 3.—(AP)—Six passengers and two pilots of a West Coast Air Transport passenger plane were injured when the plane crashed near midnight in the heavily timbered mountainous country several miles from De Saba, 29 miles northeast of here.

H. H. Putnam, of Burlingame, and E. Silver, of San Francisco, were rushed to a hospital here.

Others injured, none seriously, were: Noel D. Evans, relief pilot, bruised; Louis C. Goldsmith, San Francisco, pilot, bruised nose; Mildred Du Vitt, Seattle, sprained ankle; A. S. Whitmore, Redwood City, deep face cuts, chest bruises and possible internal injuries; Mabeline Rieky, Seattle, weather bureau expert, cuts and bruises; Frank R. Jeffery, Seattle attorney, cuts and bruises.

Crash Near De Saba

The plane was discovered after it crashed by an armed reeve of the mountain country who brought four of the injured to the camp of the Pacific Power and Gas company at 4:30 a. m.

The camp, four miles from De Saba, is at the top of a mountain and the plane had crashed on the opposite side of the mountain from De Saba.

The plane left Portland yesterday at 12:10 a. m. and was due at San Francisco late yesterday afternoon.

Battles Heavy Weather

Goldsmith encountered heavy weather in crossing the mountains two California and at 7:15 p. m. landed at Corning, 150 miles from San Francisco, where he took on 200 pounds of gasoline to get him to his destination. He said the weather was bad but that he believed he could make it. Two hours later the plane was believed sighted over Corning. Later it was sighted over Maxco which indicated the plane was flying in circles, evidently endeavoring to find a safe place to land.

Portland Stock Exposition Open; Ends Next Week

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 3.—(AP)—Thousands of school children from Portland and other cities today thronged the pavilion of the Pacific International Livestock exposition at the opening of the 15th annual display. Fine dairy and beef cattle, hogs, sheep, goats and horses were in the stalls ready to be inspected and judged. The show will continue throughout next week.

The first horse show performance this afternoon featured trick ponies and demonstrations by sheep dogs. There will be a horse show performance tonight and each night next week.

Several counties of Oregon have displays in the land products division of the exposition.

Teams from colleges of the Pacific coast and British Columbia began judging this morning in dairy and livestock divisions, preliminary to the regular judging of the entries.

"Walker M. Pierce is very strong in the county and particularly in the North Powder district," Mr. Johnson said over the telephone to The Observer. "Lots of the farm votes will also go for Smith."

Mr. Johnson did not attempt to make an estimate in numbers of the expected vote.

Predicts Pierce Victory

Victor Kelley, secretary of the congressional committee, this morning predicted that Mr. Pierce would win over Judge H. B. Butler in the entire district. "There may be some larger towns—Klamath Falls, Bend, The Dalles and Pendleton—that will go for Butler," Mr. Kelley said, "but I believe there's a majority in Union county and in the rural districts will put him over. It is an even bet today that he will carry Union county, as the north end is far Pierce. I expect him to carry Union county with a majority of from 1,500 to 2,000."

Mr. Kelley also expressed confidence that Smith will carry the county and predicted the re-election of State Senator Albert B. Hunter, School Superintendent E. A. Sayre and said that he believed that John Hodgins will come out of the election victorious.

"I expect J. A. Nee to pull a large rural vote and O. C. Fleishman should also receive large support from the farmers," Mr. Kelley said, adding that Ora Wilson, candidate for county clerk, is expected to receive a heavy vote from the women of the county.

He expects from 2,500 to 3,000 votes to be cast in Union county Tuesday.

Carbon disinfectant is a good insecticide for fumigating stored grains, cowpeas, beans and peas.
