## Colored Singers To Give Sacred Concert Sunday

Will Appear in First M. E.  
Church in Evening—  
Church Army to Start  
Week's Services Here

Among the church services  
scheduled in La Grande for Sun-  
day, two are attracting more than  
ordinary interest. At the First  
Methodist Episcopal church, the  
William colored singers, who ap-  
peared in concert here Friday  
night in the L. D. S. tabernacle,  
will give a sacred concert at 7:30  
o'clock. There will be no charge.  
It is expected that a capacity crowd  
will fill the church for the pro-  
gram.

The pastor will speak in the  
morning at the M. E. church on  
"A Worker's Church." Special  
music will include the following  
numbers: voluntary, "Nightingale"  
by Novins, "O Land of God" by In-  
coln, song by Mrs. George Thom-  
son, and "The Wild Rose" by  
McDonnell, and "March" by Guil-  
mont, with Miss Gladys Miller at  
the organ.

**Episcopal Church.**  
There, at 9 a. m., St. Peter's Episcopal  
church, the 7:30 o'clock service in  
the evening will be conducted by  
members of the Church Army, the  
address to be made by Captain  
Bushman. Mrs. H. N. Ashby, at  
the organ, will play prelu-
