Bridge Pointers

(Mr. Work's articles on Mondays are written for the Bridge novice.)

As each new Bridge season comes around it brings with it a crop of errors which circulate among players of little experience and tend to hinder them in their play. This season is no exception in that respect, and a number of absurd "rules" are obtaining widespread circulation in various sections of the country. I know about this because questions about them are sent to me every day. The two absurdities which seem to be having a run right now have to do with Declarer's score when he is doubled.

It frequently is contended that a Declarer who makes more than the amount of his doubled contract is permitted to count for tricks below the line only his contract at doubled value, and that any extra tricks must be scored above the line at 50 or 100 per trick (both rumors are current). As an example, if he bid two Diamonds, was doubled and made four odd, the contention is that he would get only the amount of his doubled bid (two times 14 equals 28) below the line and a bonus (the amount of which seems to be in doubt) above the line. The correct score would be the doubled value of all four odd-tricks (four times 14 equals 56) below the line, and 150 (50 for making a doubled contract and 50 for each extra trick) above the line.

The misunderstanding in this case probably is due to confusion between Auction Bridge and Contract Bridge scoring. In Auction Bridge a player who makes his bid scores all his tricks below the line regardless of the size of his contract; and poor game when his trick-score reaches 30 or more; he gets his game (and in Progressive his bonus of 125) when his tricking it is due solely to the double, as it would be if a bid of three Diamonds was doubled and the contract was made.

Another misunderstanding of a somewhat similar nature seems to arise when a Declarer goes down more tricks than the number he has bid. To illustrate: Declarer bids two (total of eight tricks) and makes only five tricks; the contention is that he cannot be penalized more than his bid and that consequently the adversaries would be entitled to score only 100—50 for each trick that was bid and not made. The fact is that a two-bid to take eight tricks; and if Declarer should make only five, the adversaries have won three under-tricks, for each of which they are entitled to 50 points if the contract was not doubled—100 if doubled, 200 if redoubled.

Penalties are not affected by doubling, nor by a failure to make the contract; in all cases they are counted for the side that holds them.

ter. Surround with sardines and sections of hard cooked eggs. This makes an excellent luncheon dish for the whole family since very small persons may have the spinach and a little egg.

Pear Salad
Two large pears, 1 orange, 3 egg whites, 1 cup water, 1/2 cup chopped nut meats, 1/2 cup sliced and seeded grapes, evoked dressing, 4 tablespoons whipped cream, hearts of lettuce.

Peel pears and remove cores. Make a syrup of sugar and water and add pears and oranges cut in thin slices. Cook until pears are transparent. Remove from heat and cool. Cook syrup until it reaches the jelly stage. Fill cavities of the pears with this jelly. Add grapes and nuts to salad dressing and mix pears. Garnish with a spoonful of sweetened whipped cream.

Hard winter pears are delicious prepared in this way.

MT. GLEN (Special) — Farm work is progressing rapidly here. A large acreage of fall wheat is already planted and many hundred acres of land are being prepared for seeding. The fall rains have made the ground so it is easily worked and the farmers seem very optimistic over the continued good planting weather.
