Nationally, the vote is tremendous. Lines waited at the polls in Richmond, and the heaviest vote every recorded in Virginia, has already been reported. In Chicago around 100,000 were voting each hour. By 11 o'clock more than half of the 1,440,000 registered voters had voted. Incidentally, the voting hours lasted virtually no time.

In Cleveland, Ohio, John J. Rusk had a line of voters 2000 feet long by 11 o'clock. In New York city at least 50 per cent of the total registration had voted by noon. In some precincts the figure was more than 100 per cent. Portland, Ore., reported an increase in early voting of 10 per cent. Kansas city had more than 20 per cent voters by 5 o'clock this morning.
