Parent-Teacher Groups Prepare For Convention

Plans are under way by the parent-teacher organizations in La Grande for attendance at the district conference to be held in Pendleton, Nov. 14 to 18.

A cup is to be awarded for the largest growth in membership shown in any organization and La Grande groups are hard at work on their membership campaigns.

Features of the convention will be the president's breakfast the second morning to be followed by president's conferences.

On the evening of the second day a banquet will be held.

Miss Morelle Hair, of Eugene, member of the extension division of the University of Oregon, will be there to present a new plan of study available for members of the Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers.

Oregon State college is planning a system of such studies for study clubs to be broadcast over station at Corvallis.

In this way the chairman is to give plans and instructions to clubs in a more efficient manner than was heretofore possible.

Mrs. W. W. Gabriel of Portland, president, and other state officers are to be present at the convention.

A number of exhibits will be shown, including displays of posters and scrapbooks telling of parent-teacher activities.

In addition, other organizations, including Four-H clubs, boy scouts and campfire girls are to have exhibits and to encourage public schools also to give displays.

Mrs. A. G. Cook (Observer Correspondent) COVE, Ore. (Special)—The grocery store of W. J. Hallmark was broken into during the night of Nov. 2 and about 1400 of goods stolen.

The thieves entered through the basement, breaking two locked doors before an entrance was made. The loot carried off consisted of two guns, several boxes of ammunition, cigars, tobacco, candy, gum, canvas gloves, matches and everything that came their way, besides what money was in the till.

Fortunately, there was not much cash in the till, mostly small change, amounting to between \$8 and \$10. The loss is quite a severe one to Mr. Hallmark as the volume of business in a small town is not very large and a few hundred dollars' loss does away with several months' profits.
