## MENUS

**By Sister Mary**  
**BREAKFAST**—Orange juice, cereal, cream, baked French toast, brown sugar-syrup, milk, coffee.  
**LUNCHEON**—Cream of onion soup, cutlets, tomato and cabbage salad, rice pudding, grape juice.  
**DINNER**—Smothered chicken, twice baked sweet potatoes, French fried onions, apple celery and nut salad, vanilla ice cream with caramel sauce, milk, coffee.

The following method of cooking chicken is quite novel and decidedly worth while when one chicken must serve many. The tomato sauce with mushrooms may be omitted, but really adds much to the savoriness of the dish. The chicken can be broiled if preferred, before cooking if preferred.

**Smothered Chicken**  
 One chicken weighing about 4 pounds, 4 or 5 thin slices bacon, 1 onion, 1 carrot, 1 cup dried celery, 1 white smoked ham, 4 tablespoons dried tomato pulp, 4 tablespoons chopped mushrooms, 1/2 teaspoon pepper.

Truss chicken as far roasting or broiling for serving, cover bottom of closely covered kettle or small roaster with slices of bacon and add chicken. Chop onion, carrot, celery and ham, adding the "bits"—heart, gizzard and liver—of the chicken. Spread this mixture over chicken and cover kettle.

Cook over a medium fire until bacon is brown. Add boiling water to half cover chicken, cover closely and cook in a slow oven for two hours. Remove chicken to hot platter, add tomato and mushroom sauce and bring to the boiling point. Serve the sauce in a gravy boat.

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## Bridge Pointers

We conclude today the series of fifty Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday Bridge questions which have been running during September and October.

**Deal 2**

South Dealer, contract No Trump, the adversaries have not bid.

To the first trick West leads the four of clubs, North (Dummy) plays the Ace, East the Five, and South the Six.

To the second trick, North leads the "Trey of Diamonds, East plays the Deuce, South the Queen, and West the Ten.

Question No. 58. What cards should be led and played by Dealer from Closed Hand and Dummy to the third trick?

**Answer Blank**

59. To trick 3, Dealer should lead \_\_\_\_\_ from Closed Hand and play \_\_\_\_\_ from Dummy.

## The Answer

58. Dealer should lead the three of hearts and play the Ace from Dummy.

The play on the second trick has made it almost sure that West has no more diamonds and that Dealer has the game in hand and need not risk it. West may have had K-10-7 of diamonds and have played the Ten on the first round as a camouflage, but that is most improbable. If the remaining diamonds are in the East hand, Dealer is sure of five diamonds, three spades, one heart and one club. This heart finesse is tempting because, if it be tried and wins, Dealer would make a Grand Slam; but if it lost, it would be to East's King and East would return West's club lead. Then, if West led clubs from the King, the adversary would have game. The gambler should not be wick to try for a Grand Slam.
