GOOD ADVICE ABOUT MOLES—By Rowland H. Harris, M. D., Battle Creek, Michigan

There are few men or women who do not have moles. These growths are present at birth but may not become visible until later in life. They may occur anywhere on the skin from the top of the head to the tips of the toes. They are sometimes useful as marks of identification. They are, however, undesirable because of their known tendency to become malignant growths when injured.

Moles vary from light brown to black in color, and in size from a small dot to an area several inches in diameter. They are usually raised above the level of the surrounding skin, and they enter through the entire thickness of the skin, although the pigment may be limited to the surface. They bleed freely when injured.

Slightly pigmented moles have been known to give rise to melanoma cancer of the skin. Melanoma cancer, which is a highly malignant growth, is probably most likely to begin in sun deeply pigmented moles, and the disease extends through the lymphatic channels, causing secondary growth in neighboring lymph glands and in other parts of the body.

Good advice about moles is either to let them entirely alone and to protect them from injury, or else to remove or destroy them completely. The use of caustics is a dangerous method of treatment. Surgical removal with a good margin of normal skin is safe and satisfactory, and has the advantage that it can be made painless by local anesthesia. Furthermore, the fine scars can be produced which

are observable only on close scrutiny.

These moles that are growing in size or pigmentation, or that have become irritated, infected, bled, scratched, cut, torn or otherwise injured, should be promptly removed. These moles that are subject to repeated injury, as in combing the hair or in shaving, and those likely to be injured by the friction or pressure of overlying clothing, especially about the shoulders, waist, groin or feet, should be removed before any malignant transformation occurs.

Every mole that has been incompletely removed by any method whatever, whether by excision, ligature, freezing, cauterization, electrolysis, radium or X-ray should be surgically removed by an incision well beyond the limits of the mole.

In view of these considerations, one is justified in having all moles removed and not those alone that are unsightly. Five or six moles may be conveniently excised at one operation. Removal of certain very large moles, or birthmarks, may be impossible or undesirable, but only the individual surgeon may say what shall be done in a given instance.
