gardeners. It is a perfectly hardy fly, but doesn't always succeed as well as it might because it has a liking for other foliage to shade the ground about it.

Lilies that anyone can grow are the tiger lilies. Closely following them are the Madonna or old-fashioned white lily which does well in good soil but doesn't stand dry, hot soil well. Our native swamp lily, *L. superbum*, grows well in some gardens. It is one of the many lilies that like an acid soil.

The stately auricular or gold-banded fly which will thrive for a season or two and then dwindle is another.

Deep planting for those whose stems carry a large part of the root system is one of the secrets of lily culture. The auricular fly is one of these and it will do no harm to plant it a foot deep. In fact, it is likely to do much better at this depth than at six inches.

The candidia fly, *Lilium candidum*, and old-fashioned garden lily in shiny orange-scarlet tones is coming back and deservedly. It is one of the showiest of the early June bloomers and large groups of it are striking pictures in the garden. They are much used with the lavender lines.

A new miniature tiger lily, Mrs. Willmott's fly, *Lilium Willmottiae*, is making its way in gardens. It is a true miniature and one of the lilies easily raised from seed.

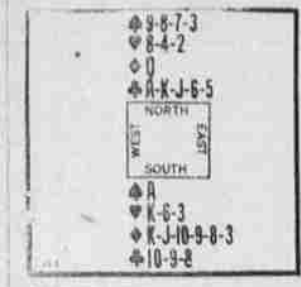

Bridge Pointers

Our Series of Fifty Auction Bridge questions ended yesterday, but we are giving today one more similar interesting hand.

Today's Hand



EXACT CUT
 Dealer (North), South Declarer, Contract No Trump.

First trick: West, Five of Hearts; North, The Queen; East, The Ace; South, The Ten.

Second trick: East the Queen of Hearts, South the Six, West the Seven, and North the Four.

The third trick consisted of four Hearts and South won with the King.

Question: What card should South lead to trick 4, and what card should be played on that trick from Dummy?

Answer: Blank
 To trick 4, South should lead and Dummy should play

(After the blank before you read the answer that follows.)

The Answer
 To trick 4, South should lead the King of Diamonds from Closed Hand and play the Queen of Diamonds from Dummy.

The declarer must make the Ace of Diamonds and will cash the thirteenth Heart (which West obviously holds) if the Ace of Diamonds is in the West hand. Declarer, having lost two tricks, can spare these two additional tricks, but cannot afford to lose any more. If he tried the Club finesse, and that lost, and if West held the Ace of Diamonds, he would lose a total of five tricks and game.

If he led a small Diamond from Closed Hand at trick 4 to let Dummy's Queen win, the Diamonds would not be established if the adversary who held the Ace did not play it. Declarer then would need one entry to get into the Closed Hand to establish his Diamonds, and another to run them. But by leading the King and continuing the Diamonds until the Ace fell, South could need only one entry, which he has.
