WHY A DOCTOR TAPS YOUR CHEST

It is common to see a physician examine a patient's chest by tapping upon it with his finger, yet few persons who have watched the procedure know the curious origin of that method of diagnosis. I will tell how it came into use.

Sebastian and Maria Theresa (Kashutka) Anzenbruger kept an inn called "The Black Moorish Woman" (Zem Schwarzweibin) in Graz, Southern Austria. They had a son named Leopold. The boy helped his father about the inn, but was sent to school in his native town and afterwards educated as a physician in Vienna, where he practiced with distinguished success.

One day at the autopsy of a patient upon whom he had not succeeded in making an exact diagnosis, Dr. Anzenbruger found fluid in the chest. There had been a pleurisy and the resulting fluid had accumulated between layers covering the lung. "Why did I not discover this during life?" he demanded of himself. Studying the problem, he remembered how his father, who used to serve wine to his guests, could tell, by slapping and tapping upon the sides of his

WILL FILED FOR PROBATE

REDWOOD CITY, Cal., Nov. 8 (AP)—The will of Cora Jane Flood, sister of the late James L. Flood, "Bonanza King," was filed for probate here, disposing of an estate valued at between "one and two million dollars." The doctor then tried the effect of slapping and tapping on the chests of his patients and also of well persons, and noted the differences in the sounds over different parts of the chest in the presence of fluids or of congested lungs, as was afterward determined by the results of the cases, and he wrote a book about it in the year 1761.

This method of examination, known as percussion, has been developed to great perfection. In connection with auscultation (listening to the breath sounds), and observation of the movements of the chest in breathing and of other symptoms, and sometimes by the use of X-rays, physicians can discover with a great degree of accuracy, the condition of the organs boxed up out of sight in that crate composed of ribs, breast-bone, and spine.

Often disease could be detected in its early stage, or not too far advanced for cure, if people would only go to their physician and have a thorough examination.

There may be warning symptoms or in other cases there may be no symptoms at all known to the patient. He also steals upon him insidiously until discovered by the physician.

On the other hand, if the physician finds him sound, it gives great satisfaction to know it. Besides this, if later on by another examination the physician discovers disease, he is able to judge the length of time it has been present, as he knows it was not there at his previous examination.

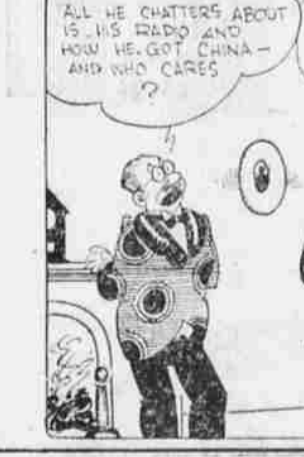
