MENUS

BREAKFAST—Grapefruit juice, cereal, cream, salt codfish and parsnip hash, toasted corn, muffins, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Black bean soup, toast sticks, endive salad, marmalade and nut rolls, milk, tea.

DINNER—Fish steaks steamed in tomato sauce, buttered lima beans, spinach and egg salad, pear spider cake, milk, coffee.

Marmalade and nut rolls are delicious for afternoon tea. If prepared and put in the pan ready for baking, they can be baked in a hot oven while the water is boiling and the tea steeping and served hot and fresh with the tea. These little rolls are also good with a plain green salad served with French dressing.

Marmalade and Nut Rolls
Two cups flour, 4 teaspoons baking powder, 1 scant teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons butter, about 1/2 cup milk, cup orange marmalade, 1/2 cup broken nut meats, 2 tablespoons softened butter.

Mix and sift flour, salt and baking powder. Roll in butter with tips of fingers and cut in milk. Use enough milk to make a soft dough. Turn onto a flour molding board and roll into a rectangular sheet not more than one-half inch thick. Spread lightly with softened butter, then spread with marmalade and sprinkle with nuts. Roll over and over, making a roll about two inches in diameter. Cut in slices three-fourths inch thick. Place cut side down on a well-buttered baking pan and bake 15 minutes in a hot oven.

Bridge Pointers

CONTRACT BRIDGE

Continuing our series of Contract hands in which North & South do all the bidding. East & West pass whenever it is their turn to declare. We have a hand today which takes two or three interesting Contract questions.

Make up your mind how South (Dealer) and North (partner) should bid before you read the comment that follows.

THE BIDDING

South should bid two Spades. With three Aces. No Trump is tempting; but with a strong five-card Major suit and a defensive suit, the Major bid is much safer. If South held six Spades, there would be no question about bidding more than one; but with only five cards, some danger is connected with bidding two if North is a partner who is liable to jump to four with only two Spades. On the other hand, one Spade would be a dangerous bid because North with strength enough to jump a bid of two, may not have the strength to jump a one-bid, and so an opportunity to make game might be lost. Assuming a capable partner, South's safe and sound bid is two Spades.

After South's two Spades, North should bid two No Trumps to show South that North has less than normal Spade support, but has two

other suits stopped. When North bids two No Trumps, which he can do with safety because he knows that North has two suits taken care of, and those two suits must be the two Majors; so the Club danger, which deterred South from bidding No Trump originally, is now removed.

It will be noted that game at No Trump must be easy no matter which suit advertisement opens; but that game at Spades might fail if there were a bad division of the adverse Spades.
