Bridge Pointers

By Milton C. Work

CONTRACT BRIDGE.
We continue today our series of Contract hands in which East & West pass whenever it is their turn to declare, and North & South do all the bidding. Before you read the comment that follows, make up your mind how should be bid this hand in Contract.

TODAY'S HAND.

♠	A-Q-7-5-3
♥	K-4-2
♦	8-7
♣	A-10-2

THE BIDDING.
South should bid one No Trump. He has three suits safely stopped and a hand that counts 12-3 in Spades, 5 in Hearts, 1 in Diamonds and 4 in Clubs.

North has tremendous assistance for South's No Trump and it looks to him as if there is a No Trump game in the cards; but North cannot tell whether the better result will be obtained by playing Spades or No Trump. North knows that if he bids two No Trumps, South will not go to three without considerably more than the minimum strength which justifies an initial one-bid; furthermore, North's two No Trump bid would not show anything about North's Spades.

If North should bid two Spades South, with minimum No Trump strength and some help for Spades, would pass and game could not be made because not bid for so North's best declaration is THREE Spades. This does not commit the side to either a Spade or a No Trump contract, but leaves the option with South.

Bids four Spades. His No Trump strength is but little over minimum, so he has not rebid strength in his own hand; but North's bid has announced: "I want this hand played at a game-going bid. I am in doubt whether that game-going bid had better be Spades or No Trump. I am telling you that I have five strong Spades and of late hope for your No Trump. You determine which will be the better game-bid."
