tion fund \$2,300 less. In addition to this there is no election item. The 1928 figure for election expenses was \$4,300.

Increases Listed

Increases were made as follows: treasurer's office \$50 more; court house \$100 more; county farm \$300 more; pauper fund \$2,000 more; widows' pensions \$200 more; health nurse \$250 more; county school fund \$100 more and library fund \$1 more.

The pauper's fund included county aid allowances, hospital expenses, county physician, burials, special care for indigents and supplies for indigents. The increase in the county health nurse's appropriation was to pay the balance due on a car recently provided.

The preliminary annual extermination fund is the same as before, \$500, and most of the other items are identical with the 1928 budget. The county school fund in the new budget is \$57,600, the high school tuition fund is \$25,000 and the library fund is \$575.

Auto License Fund
Union county expects to receive \$27,500 from the state from the auto license fees. Under state law one-fourth of auto license fees from such county are returned to the county after deducting collection expenses.

The new budget provides for \$54,000 for market road work, a figure \$7,050 higher than in 1928. However, the interest on road bonds is set at \$10,000, which is a reduction of \$5,000. The road bond redemption fund is the same, \$50,000.

Estimated expenditures on roads and bridges is \$57,000 and estimated receipts \$52,000, leaving the amount to be raised by taxation on this item \$25,000.

The Proclamation

The proclamation signed by Mr. Hill follows:

"The people of the city of La Grande have the greatest admiration for the splendid service given by her sons and daughters in time of war. They appreciate the heroic sacrifices that have been made by the loyal men and women who have so ably defended this great nation of ours in every emergency.

"Today we have in this city an organization composed of those who only a decade ago were engaged in that most glorious service. They served their country well and when the war was over they handed themselves into the American Legion, determined to continue the same service they gave overseas. They dedicated their organization to 'God and country' and immediately began that work which has identified the American Legion as one of the greatest patriotic forces America has ever known.

"One of the first tasks of the legion was to make provision for the relief and rehabilitation of those who were disabled. They looked after the welfare of the children who were left orphans by the war. Then they launched a great program of unselfish service to community, state and nation. Many activities were undertaken by the legion in an effort to serve the people and the country.

"The year the legion, and the legion auxiliary which is associated with the legion in its work, is anxious that the 1929 program will be started as soon as possible. In order that the full strength of the two organizations can thus early be put to work on the great objectives of the coming year, the week of Nov. 11 to 17 has been set aside when every effort will be made by the legion and the auxiliary to have paid up for 1929 the dues of all who are 1928 members.

"The citizens of La Grande are justly appreciative of this peace time service of the legion and are willing to contribute their efforts to the success of the legion program. It is appropriate and fitting that the people of this city should pledge full co-operation to the legion and legion auxiliary in its membership program.

"Now, therefore, I, A. T. Hill, president of the city commission of La Grande, proclaim the week beginning Nov. 11 and ending Nov. 17, as American Legion week, and

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urge every citizen to encourage and aid the legion in enrolling members for the coming year. Every World war veteran, particularly he who has not heretofore belonged to the legion, should take this opportunity of becoming associated in the great work.

"In Witness Whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the city of La Grande to be affixed. Done in the city of La Grande, this 10th day of November, in the year of our Lord One Thousand Nine Hundred and
