## Armistice Day To Be Observed In The Churches

Sunday Program Will Also Include Special Baptist Services and Conference at Island City

Armistice day will be generally observed in the churches of La Grande tomorrow, with some of the churches holding special programs including the First Presbyterian, the English Lutheran and St. Peter's Episcopal.

Also, Sunday evening's service at the Episcopal church will be the last service at which the Church Army will be in attendance and services at the Baptist church will be devoted generally to "Recognition Day." H. S. Hamilton, district superintendent, will be at the Island City church Sunday evening.

### Presbyterian Church

Members of the American Legion will be at the First Presbyterian church on Sunday morning at 11 o'clock, and the pastor, the Rev. J. George Watz, will speak on "His Made Democracy Possible." Mrs. Harley Richardson at the organ console will play the "Prelude" by Debussy and the postlude "Marche Romantique" by Gounod. The choir, Mrs. A. L. Richardson directing, will sing the anthem, "Hear Ye, O Lord," by Mozart-Saunders, and the quartet, Mrs. A. L. Richardson, soprano; Mrs. W. H. Bohlenkamp, alto; Mrs. E. E. Hurley, tenor; and E. D. Towler, basso, will sing "Song of Moses" by Gounod, and "Thou Will Keep Him in Perfect Peace" by Peace.

market road status, at the expense of the federal government, traveling a part level and rugged section, considerable of which is desert. McBurnett is 34 miles north-west of Wilmington, N. C., and the latter is all timber and swamps, would be the terminus of U. S. 25. Idaho's aims, however, are by making a series of road connections between Winnemucca, to reach San Francisco via an all-highway route, the maximum mileage of which would be around 700 miles from Weiser—as well as to other California points, notably Los Angeles, and the Mexican boundary.

## Help Keep Your City Clean

One state licensed garbage plant has taken over the disposal of all the wet garbage in the city and to better facilitate the handling of it and to comply with the ordinance, they have adopted the following set of rules:

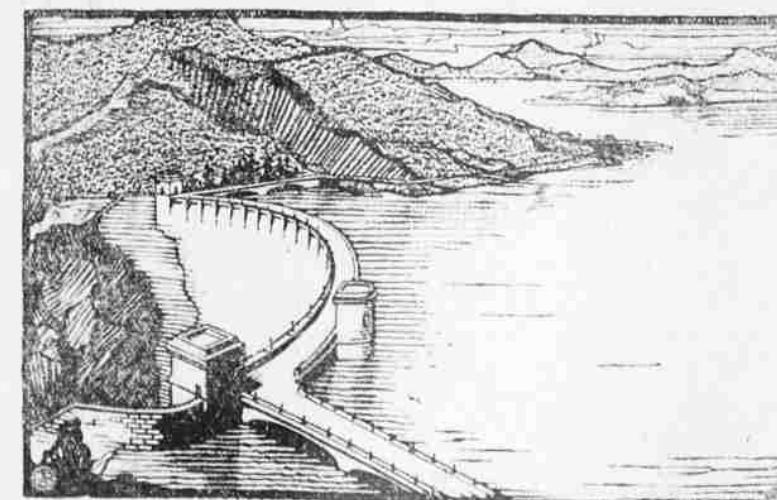
### RULES

City ordinances regulating garbage disposal contain the following provisions:

1. Wet garbage is considered to be scraps from tables that are fit for feeding stock. Coffee grounds is considered dry garbage and must be placed with either ashes, cans or paper.
  2. Dry garbage consists of ashes, cans, papers, lawn grass, etc.
  3. Leaves, limbs and other bulky material are deemed excess, at our option, and may, at our option, be charged for at extra rates.
  4. All wet garbage must be kept in a sanitary standard can. Any can over 5-gallon capacity must have one handle on each side and container must not be loaded over 100 pounds of garbage.
  5. Leaky or damaged garbage cans will not meet city health inspection, and it is our duty to notify patron of such fact for immediate repair or replacement. Cans must be kept in sanitary condition at all times. The Clean-Up shall not be held responsible for either dry or wet garbage not in standard containers, and hauling rates shall be determined by the kind of containers used and by the condition of the garbage.
  6. Under fire ordinances, ashes must be kept in fire-proof containers and we urge close observance of this rule. (We are not required to enforce this law, as it does not come under our department.)
- Sanitary conditions at lowest possible cost, is our aim, and your co-operation in providing standard equipment will make it so. Any complaint in regard to our service, phone 149-J.
- The garbage is not charged with the enforcement of the ordinance but they are desirous of seeing the people of La Grande comply with its requirements. This can best be done by becoming familiar with the above rules and by cooperation with the men engaged in this work and with other residents who are interested in a healthy and clean city.
