The commission long ago promised him that the Roosevelt highway from Seal Rocks to Alsea Bay and then on to Yachats, 15.3 miles, will be ordered as soon as the Dunne bills were lost. Federal money from the federal government will be used on this project, and the contracts will be let before January 1, it was said.

Federal Fund Matched.—The state now has \$1,152,000 to appropriation in federal aid funds. A meeting with the government officials will be held soon and this money allocated to the various roads.

The Harry-Lorenz Mill section is the last uncompleted part of the Klamath Falls-Lakeview highway. It will be completed as rapidly as possible, so surfacing can be done in 1929.

Scout Leaders To Learn What The Boys Know

Something new in Boy Scouting in La Grande will be started tonight. The scout masters are going to scout school to learn to do everything their scouts can do. This first lesson of a three months training school for scout masters is to be conducted by E. Russell Scott, Eastern Oregon boy scout executive, and other leaders.

Twenty scout masters have signed up for the lessons. The outline of their course is summed up in the following words: "What, how, why, where."

The Rev. V. E. Hall will give a series of five lectures on the "Why" of scouting. Other lectures are to be given in the program designed to instruct the scout masters.

The meetings are to be held once a week at 7:30 o'clock in the basement of the Methodist church and the course is given free of charge.

Two of the meetings are to be outdoors and one is to be an over night camping trip.

At the meeting tonight Dr. W. T. Phay, president of the scout council, will talk on "Why the Training School."

The training school has been outlined and was originated by the national scout association headquarters.

"Boyology" is the theme of the psychological part of the program. Talks are to be given on the psychology of boys in the following periods: the unfolding boy, the boy at play, the pre-adolescent, the gang age and the boy and his gang.

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length of the field, pushing the Tigers before them, until they pierced the 16-yard line. Then the La Grande boys held for downs. Reddick elected to kick and called Sing back from the line. The pass from center was off and Sing barely touched it with his fingers. The platoon crumpled over the goal line but Sing, in one of the most head-on plays of the game, retrieved it, advanced three steps, and booted it 46 yards down the field.

Backs Held in Pinch.—From then on La Grande was on the offensive most of the time, carrying the oval into Buck territory continuously but each time meeting a stonewall resistance when in the scoring zone. James Berry, playing his first game at center, made excellent passes after that first one to Sing.

La Grande went into the game with a team disorganized by sickness, injuries and disableness. Vincent Novella was placed at right end instead of Zundel who has an infected leg. Jess Parker, playing his first game, went into right tackle to take the place of Cleveland, and for the first time this year they were not running over that position, according to Coach H. W. Christie.

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John Berry was placed at center the last week in place of Paul Novella who was injured in the Baker game and showed up very well. Bob Evans took Ketter's place, who left the game because he was so sick that he couldn't deliver the goods. A number of substitutes were used in the first half in the backfield with Maurice Baker showing up in good shape in his first game.

Pace and Evans showed improved form in hitting the line and took in some pretty passes. Bob Stoddard, at quarterback, showed excellent judgment in his extra-point and returned punts from difficult positions with good gains. Rex and Novella, at ends, exhibited in pass after pass and stopped, and runs and cross plays—several times throwing their opponents for losses.

La Grande completed nearly 20 passes for long gains while Pendleton only connected with three. The game ended with La Grande preparing to try for a field goal as a conclusion to its final scoring threat.

Friday La Grande plays at Cove and on Nov. 14 the Blue Devils from Walla Walla will come to La Grande.

Melvin Gihleman, at tackle, was the outstanding player of the game. With Jess Parker, at the other tackle, he got under the plays, stopping Pendleton's throats time and again. As a sideline he smashed up interference several times.

Ring and Thompson, at guard, also played a strong game. The line, as a unit, appeared much stronger than at any time this season.

In the evening a dance, sponsored by the American Legion, was held at Zuber hall.

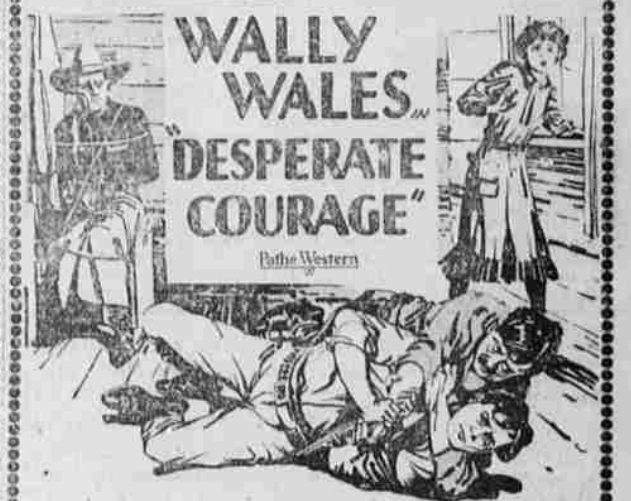


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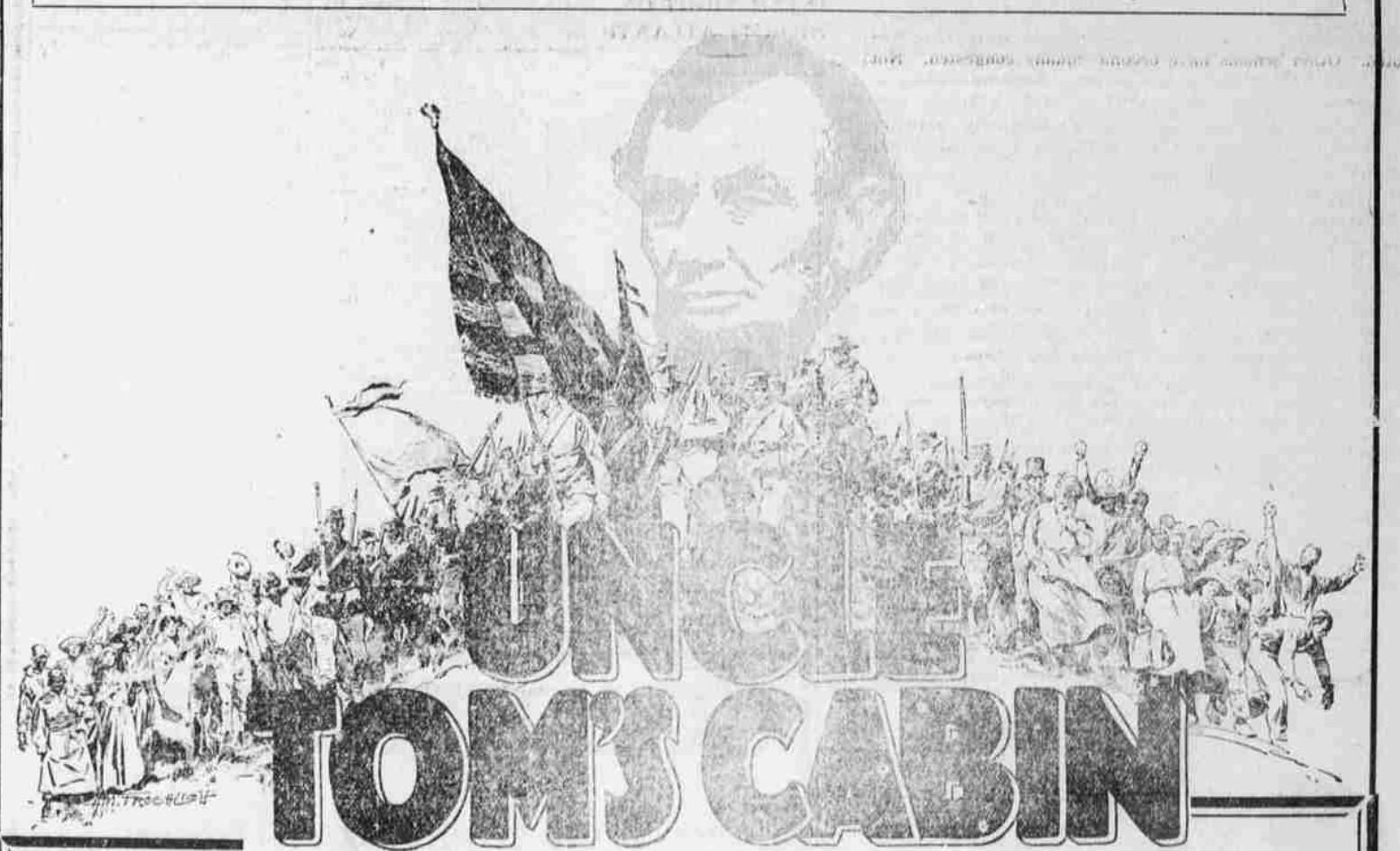
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
