Black-White Mode Noted In Jewelry

PAIRS (AP)—Even up-to-date jewelry shows a tendency to be black and white this season as a result of French preoccupation with simple modes.

The real article employs onyx and diamonds extensively in many smart forms. The imitation follows with black enamel and crystal. Dressmakers are working hand in hand with the jewelers in some cases, to further the cause of black and white.

Charm sponsors a simple ornament, used both as bracelet and necklace, of tiny diamond slides on a black cord which terminates in a ball of onyx. Another dressmaker shows a bracelet of alternating diamond oblongs and onyx circles.

The newest wrist-watch is as narrow as the silver and onyx link bracelet on which it is mounted. The links are long and narrow, and there are three rows of them, the two outer ones of silver and the inner of onyx.

There are many types of black and white bracelets, but the most effective, as well as expensive, versions are frequently onyx and diamonds worked in modernistic manner.

Costly handbags share the black and white tendency, some of the finest of them being of antelope, or suede, with onyx and diamond clasps.

Egg-shell enamel, cream white on black, is a favorite material this winter for vanity cases, cigarette boxes and handbag accessories.

Answers

1. Dummy should play the Ace of Clubs and Closed Hand should discard the Trey of Diamonds, a camouflage discard to create the impression that Declarer does not intend to use Dummy's Diamonds.

2. Dummy should lead the Trey of Spades and Closed Hand in with the Ace of Spades—the Ace being played rather than a lower honor to conceal Closed Hand's great strength.

3. Closed Hand leads the Six of Hearts. This is a camouflage lead, made with the hope of obtaining a Grand Slam. The Declarer can count six Spades, five Diamonds, the Ace of Clubs—a total of twelve tricks; he also could make three Heart tricks, but to do so would have to lose the Ace of Hearts. The only chance for the Grand Slam is that the Ace of Hearts is held by West and that if Closed Hand lead a small Heart toward Dummy's Ten, the Ace will not be played on this trick. If the Ten of Hearts win Declarer will draw all the trumps and will discard the King, Queen and Jack of Hearts on Dummy's Diamonds, thus making the thirteen tricks.

MENUS

By Sister Mary

BREAKFAST—Grapes, cereal, cream, baked sausage, bran muffins, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Creamed Spanish onions with croutons, hearts of celery, cranberry sponge, vanilla wafers, milk, tea.

DINNER—Casserole of veal steak, boiled rice, scalloped tomatoes, stuffed prune salad, coconut cream pie, milk, coffee.

Creamed Spanish Onions

Four medium sized sweet onions, 1/2 pound mushrooms, 2 tablespoons of butter, 2 tablespoons of flour, 1 1/2 cups of milk, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 2 slices bread cut 1/2 inch thick.

Peel onions and cut in halves. Cook in boiling salted water for one hour, changing the water twice. Drain and put into a buttered baking dish. In the meantime peel and remove stems from mushrooms. Break in pieces and add to butter melted in a sauce pan. Cover and shake over a hot fire for five minutes. Stir in flour and stir with a fork until thoroughly blended. Season with salt and pepper and add milk. Trim crusts from bread and spread lightly with butter. Cut into 1/2 inch cubes and toast in a hot oven. Sprinkle over onions and mix. Bake in baking dish in a hot oven for 10 minutes to make very hot and serve from baking dish.

Any onions can be used in this fashion, but the sweet onions are more delicately flavored.

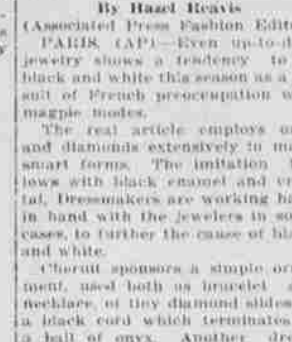
