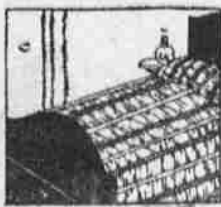

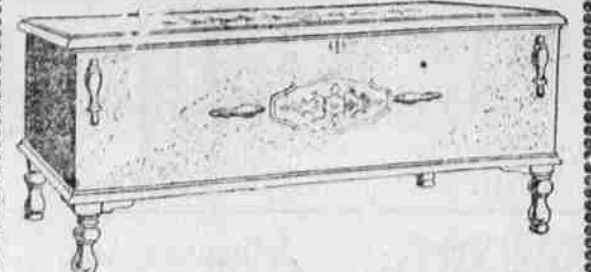

Three Boys of Salem Make Way Selling Blooms

David, Delmar and Jennings were in town yesterday. You probably saw them. They were selling flowers—gorgeous red, pink and yellow ones—roses they were which smelled fragrant of perfume. "It's high powered perfume too," says David. "It costs \$1.25 an ounce." The roses were arranged four in a bouquet and the flowers were attached to long slender green stems.

David, Delmar and Jennings make their living by selling the roses which they make themselves. The boys travel from town to town in an automobile. David's and Delmar's mother is not living so the boys conceived the idea of making beauty and selling it to people to earn their living.

"I'm too old to go to high school," remarks David who is 17, "but I'm going to business college in four more years."

"I'd like to go to school," says Delmar, who is 14. "I don't like traveling around like we do because you never know if you're going to have enough money to live on until you can earn some more."

For the foliage for the bouquets the boys sent to Denver, Colo., and to Los Angeles, Cal. It is a very dark green and is called lycodium. For the petals to the flowers the boys wax crepe paper.

It only takes them ten minutes to make one bouquet of flowers. Jennings is the third member of the trio and the homes of all three boys are in Salem.

Cream Of Golf Players Ready For Oregon Go

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 15 (AP)—The first 18 holes of the Oregon \$5,000 open golf championship awaited nearly one hundred of the pick of professional golfers of North America here today on the Waverly country club course. With the exception of Leo Diegel, national professional golf association champion, every professional title holder of note in the country was ready for the opening of the tournament. Heading the list were Walter Hagen, British open champion, and Johnny Farrell, United States open king.

Today's program called for 18 holes, with another 18 for tomorrow. After the 64 low scores and ties for 64th place on the first two days' play will go into the final 36-hole round on Saturday.

Fairing for the 84 golfers who were on hand was completed yesterday. This number fell below the expectations of the committee which had figured on more than one hundred starters, but with post entries accepted at the first tee today it was predicted that the field would be substantially increased.

WOMAN GIVEN CREDIT FOR SAVING CHILD

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 15 (AP)—An unidentified woman was credited by police with having prevented the kidnapping of the 2-year-old son of Mrs. A. E. Erickson, 294 east 48th street, Tuesday.

Mrs. Erickson answered the doorbell to find two men standing on her front porch. Her baby son, barely able to toddle accompanied her to the door.

The taller of the two visitors, after greeting Mrs. Erickson, grabbed her arms and pinned them to her sides while the other man lifted the baby to his arms and started down the front steps.

At that moment the unidentified woman approached along the sidewalk. Mrs. Erickson's baby boy was lowered to the steps and both men fled, driving away in a large blue sedan, the license number of which Mrs. Erickson was unable to obtain.

SAN MATEO, Cal., Nov. 15 (AP)—Primo Bellarini, 26, Montara rancher, burned to death last night when a six-gallon still exploded and set fire to his lonely ranch home.

Wallowa Plowing Makes Progress; Weather Better

Mock (Observer Correspondent) WALLOWA, Ore., (Special).—Somewhat more settled weather is prevailing in this community and, following the showers of rain which fell during the last ten days, farmers are able to go forward with their fall work on the farms to a much better advantage. The moisture has wet the soil to great depth, making conditions for plowing much better. However, some say that more rain is really needed to put the ground in good shape. Many farmers are anxious to get as much plowing done this fall as possible, especially fields which they intend planting to spring crops, partly because it is believed by many that additional

moisture is stored in the soil through fall plowing, and also because it gives a better chance of getting spring crops seeded earlier, without it being necessary to plow when the soil is too wet. Many of the fields of fall sown wheat are still quite "spotted" due to the rain coming up very unevenly. On investigation in some of the fields it is stated that much of the seed appears to be alright. Range conditions have shown some improvement with the late moisture and warm weather, but the new grass is not large enough to provide much feed yet, except for sheep which are able to do quite well on the short feed. For the purpose of providing stock water, without it being necessary to pump or draw it from wells, L. W. Minor has been building a reservoir at his farm in the hills a few miles east of town. George Cousins and Deo Gastin have been helping him. Bruce Fisher, of Leap, is constructing a new cow barn. A number of persons from this commu-

ty returned home this fall—part of the crew from Portland, where they attended the Pacific International stock show. All report the show very good. Among those attending from here were J. L. Maxwell, H. C. Briggs, A. A. Hunter and E. K. Hunter and wife. Deo and Irvin Gastin, attended the "Old-time" dance at Laidine Saturday night, reporting a large attendance, and fine time.
