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Bridge Pointers

Continuing our series of twenty-five Auction and Contract Bridge questions, we give today Deal C and question No. 6. In this hand the question asked concerns the play of an adversary—not of the declarer.

Deal C.
♠ 10-9-3-2
♥ A-K-7-4
♦ 10-9-3-2
♣ A-8-5

The contract is Spades: East has bid Clubs, but has been overcalled with Spades by South.
To trick 1, West leads the Ten of Clubs in response to East's Club bid. Dummy plays the Five, East the Ten and South the Ace.

To trick 2, East leads the Jack of Clubs. Closed Hand plays the Seven, West the Deuce, and Dummy the King.
QUESTION NO. 6. What lead should East make to trick 3? (Fill the blank before you read the answer that follows.)

Answer Blank
6. Trick 3, East should lead

The Answer
6. To trick 3, East should lead the Four of Clubs.
East knows from West's lead of the Ten of Clubs to the first trick, followed with the Deuce to the second, that West has no more Clubs. The only unplayed Club is the Nine, which is marked in the South hand. East has three high-trump Clubs than the Nine, but if East led one of them, it is possible that West would not trump, as East's Club would be high and Dummy would have to trump to take the trick. If, however, East leads a small Club, West will have to trump it in order to force a trump from Dummy. Any trump with which West ruffs must force an honor from Dummy; and if Dummy plays an honor, then East with the King and Ten of trumps left has a fourchette over Dummy's other honor, and must take one trump trick. This will save game if West has a trick in either Diamonds or Hearts.

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Duck Limit of 15
Daily Considered
*PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 15 (AP)—A proposal that Oregon and California join in reducing the bag limit on ducks to 15 a day and 20 a week was approved by the State Game Commission in session here. It was decided to submit the matter to sportsmen throughout the state for comment before taking definite action, however. The present bag limit in Oregon is 25 a day and 28 a week.

Diplomatic Pudding
Eight thin slices stale sponge cake, peach or apricot jam, 4 tablespoons orange juice, 2 eggs, 1-2 cup sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 cups milk, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla, 1/2 cup whipping cream.
Spread cake with jam and arrange in a deep dish or mold. Pour orange juice over it and let stand while making the custard. Beat eggs slightly and stir in sugar and salt. Slowly add milk, heated to the boiling point. Cook, stirring constantly, over hot water until mixture coats a spoon. Remove from heat and add vanilla. Pour hot over cake mixture. Chill and serve with cream whipped until firm, slightly sweetened and flavored with vanilla.

Browned flour does not have as much thickening power as the same amount of unbrowned flour. Some of the starch breaks down to dextrins and dextrins has no thickening power.
Cooking an egg in vigorously boiling water makes it tough. Put egg in boiling water and cook over hot water just below the boiling point 15 minutes for a hard cooked egg and 5 minutes for soft.

BREAKFAST — Baked pears, cereal, cream, French omelet, cinnamon toast, milk, coffee.
LUNCHEON — Oysters in rolls, boiled parsnips, home-made pepper relish, diplomatic pudding, milk, tea.
DINNER — Hot beef loaf, creamed sweet potatoes, romaine and grape fruit salad, Parker House rolls, raspberry spiced milk, coffee.

Canned raspberries are used for the dinner dessert. Sifted gelatin is added to the fruit and juice heated to the boiling point. When this has cooled and is beginning to thicken one or two well beaten egg whites are folded into the gelatin mixture. This mixture is turned into a mold and set aside for several hours to chill and become firm. If the fruit is rubbed through a sieve to remove the seeds quite small children may have the dessert.
