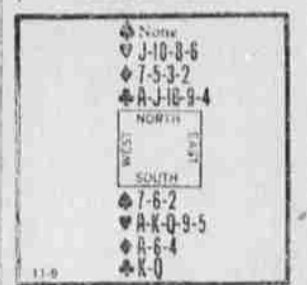

Bridge Pointers

CONTRACT BRIDGE
Continuing the series of Contract hands in which the bidding responsibility is placed with North and South, a hand is given today in which West makes one bid. At all other times West and East pass when it is their turn to declare.

TODAY'S HAND



South starts by bidding two hearts as his best, with a normal distribution of the outstanding hearts, but takes five heart tricks, on diamond and one club. He is too strong for a bid of one heart, and not strong enough for a bid of three.

Over South's two hearts, West bids two spades, and the question is how North and South should continue the bidding, East and West thereafter passing.

THE BIDDING
North should bid three spades, bidding one more of an adverse suit after partner has announced a suit, shows no losing tricks in the adverse suit and such great help for partner's suit that a slam seems likely.

After North's three spades, which has the effect of "settling" South's heart contract (because although not a game bid, it tells South that a slam is probable at his contract), South starts the settling process by bidding four diamonds. This bid merely means that South has the ace of diamonds. If having been determined that hearts will be the eventual contract.

Over South's four diamonds, North bids five clubs, showing the ace of clubs.

After this South is sure that a slam can be made, but instead of bidding six hearts, bids six clubs.

North is tempted to bid seven hearts, but does not dare to do so, fearing that South's six clubs means the king only; although under such circumstances it probably means king-queen. North therefore bids six hearts, and South does not quite dare to bid for the grand slam.

It will be noted that the grand slam almost surely could be made if North had trump two aces and five fourth three aces on good clubs. However, bidding for grand slam is a dangerous pastime. (Copyright, John F. Dille Co.)

RECLAMATION DEBT WILL BE WAIVED, WORD

RALEM, Ore., Nov. 15 (AP)—A debt of more than \$2,000,000, owed by the Oregon reclamation projects to the state, will be waived by the state reclamation commission and a measure recommended to the legislature by the commission providing for cancellation of the debt. This measure was made by State Treasurer T. B. Kay yesterday, speaking with the authority of the commission, to the Oregon reclamation congress.

The debt owed to the state is an account of interest payments guaranteed by the state on irrigation district bonds.

Mr. Kay's statement was roundly applauded, and brought a round of applause, especially from representatives of distressed districts for whose benefit the proposed measure will be recommended.

Relative to future policies of the commission Kay said: "I have authority to say for the commission that it will support no more new projects until the present ones are on their feet and the settlers in position to make profit."
