TWO NEW HOMES ARE BEING BUILT

Construction Activity Is Noted in Connordale; Year's Figure \$271,448

Building activity in Connordale, just below the site where the Eastern Oregon Normal school is being erected, is noted during the last week with permits being issued at the city recorder's office for two new modern homes, one to cost \$2,800 and the other \$2,500.

The largest permit of the week was issued to the La Grande school district for repair work at the high school in the amount of \$19,000.

This only applies to the roof work which will be done by Mr. Veldner. The other repairs will be made later, the roof being regarded as an emergency measure.

The week's permits resulted in bringing the total of building for the year to \$271,448. Since Nov. 1 permits have amounted to \$113,295 compared with last month's total of \$12,285.

The permits issued last week follow:

Nov. 13—William Hollins, to erect a dwelling place on Twelfth street between Washington and K, to cost \$2,500.

Nov. 14—R. A. Crawford, permit by H. R. Bennett, to erect a one-story dwelling place on Eleventh street between I and M avenue, to cost \$2,500.

Nov. 14—Dr. C. S. Moore, to erect a garage on Walnut street between Washington and Main avenue, work to cost \$400.

Nov. 15—H. H. Hall, to erect a garage on Spruce between Monroe and Madison, work to cost \$150.

Nov. 16—La Grande school district, permit by W. Volder, to construct roof on high school building on Fourth between K and M, work to cost \$19,000.

Nov. 17—E. Ackerman, for Julius Roedel, to alter and repair a brick business building on Adams between E and Greenwood, work to cost \$25.

HOME HEATING HELPS

Sprinkling water on the ashes may settle the dust, but if water is splashed on the grate bars it is likely to crack them.

Wood as a furnace fuel has the advantage of being cheap in price, clean and able to give quick increase in heat.

Weather strips around windows and doors will save fuel and make it easier to attend to the warm air furnace.

Severely cold until the house becomes cold before attending to the furnace fire. A little attention to the fire at regular intervals will enable the furnace operator to maintain an even heat throughout the home at all times.

Always close the ashpan damper door when it is necessary to check the furnace fire.

If the furnace draft is very strong it may be desirable to equip the smokepipe with a turn damper as well as a check damper.

To give proper draft the furnace smoke pipe should have a cross section area at least one-eighth as large as the cross section of the grate.

The diameter of a round flue should be at least 2 inches more than that of the smoke pipe.

The warm air furnace chosen for a home should be large enough to maintain proper room temperature for at least eight hours without attention.

Chimneys should be kept worked out of the fuel bed. They obstruct flow of air, clog the grate and may break the parts of smoking grate.

Place a small amount of fairly coarse coal at frequent intervals when quick heat is desired from the warm air furnace. From Northwest Furnace Builders.

The "air check damper" in the warm air furnace smoke pipe should not be used if the fire can be controlled by regulating the damper in the ash-pit door.

Danger from escaping gas makes it advisable to keep the fire door of the warm air furnace closed except when firing.

"Heating with sunshine" saves on fuel bills. Run up the window shades when sunshine is available.

A REAL SPANISH HOME

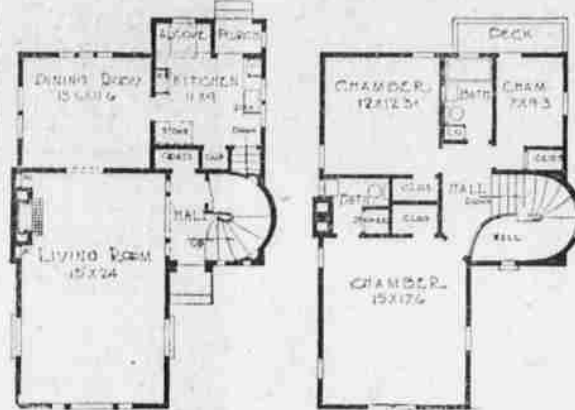

There are many unique features about this plan that are most interesting. Suitable for a narrow lot, the entrance is placed at the side, into a small entrance hall. The floor of which is raised about 8" higher than that of the balance of the house, which permits an unusual treatment of the arched entrance to the living room. Columns with ornamental iron railings are used. The circular stair with its iron hand rail, makes a most interesting treatment seen from the living room, while the treatment of the fireplace, visible from the entrance hall on entering, is most effective.

The triple window in front admits an abundance of light, the center window being stationary, with the windows on the side hinged as casements. The dining room is good size, and the kitchen portion is most complete and convenient with breakfast alcove. On the second floor are three bedrooms, the front owner's chamber has a private bath with shower. The small child's room in rear has a door opening onto a balcony for airing bedding. The other bath makes this a very complete plan. There is a full basement with furnace room, laundry, storage, fruit, etc., all partitioned off and plastered.

Large black and white tile is used for the floor of the entrance hall. It is also used for floor and wainscot in both bathrooms. Linoleum is used on the kitchen floor; balance of the floors are oak, waxed; strip for the main rooms, dark, striped, dark with a gray border, striped, with a gray border. On the first floor, rough feature, striped, kitchen wall a light green with dark green woodwork. On the second floor the sand floated walls are tinted, the front room pink, rear room yellow and maid's room blue. The cost of this home is placed at \$7,500 to \$8,000, exclusive of heating and plumbing.
