The Maryland has set a pace of 18 knots for usual cruising speed, which will be maintained unless it is necessary to speed up the schedule of visits between Colombia and Venezuela. The Maryland will remain at the latter port a week after the Hoover party starts by train for Buenos Aires.

Before reaching Corinto, Mr. Hoover plans to inspect the ship. As he moves about the craft he always has in the background one of four secret service men who are accompanying him on the voyage. They will remain with him, at least until inauguration day.

Many Text Books To Be Used Again

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 20 (AP)—When the Oregon textbook commission met here yesterday to adopt a third of the books to be used in Oregon schools during the next six years it made over half of them re-adoptions. The law requires that the commission, every two years, adopt or re-adopt a third of the books to be used the following six years.

Economy entered largely into the board's deliberations. It was said though there was no sacrifice of merit in selections. Prices of the books are about the same as quoted two years ago.

About 20 publishers were represented, but the agenda were not permitted in the meeting.
