WORK DURING WINTER

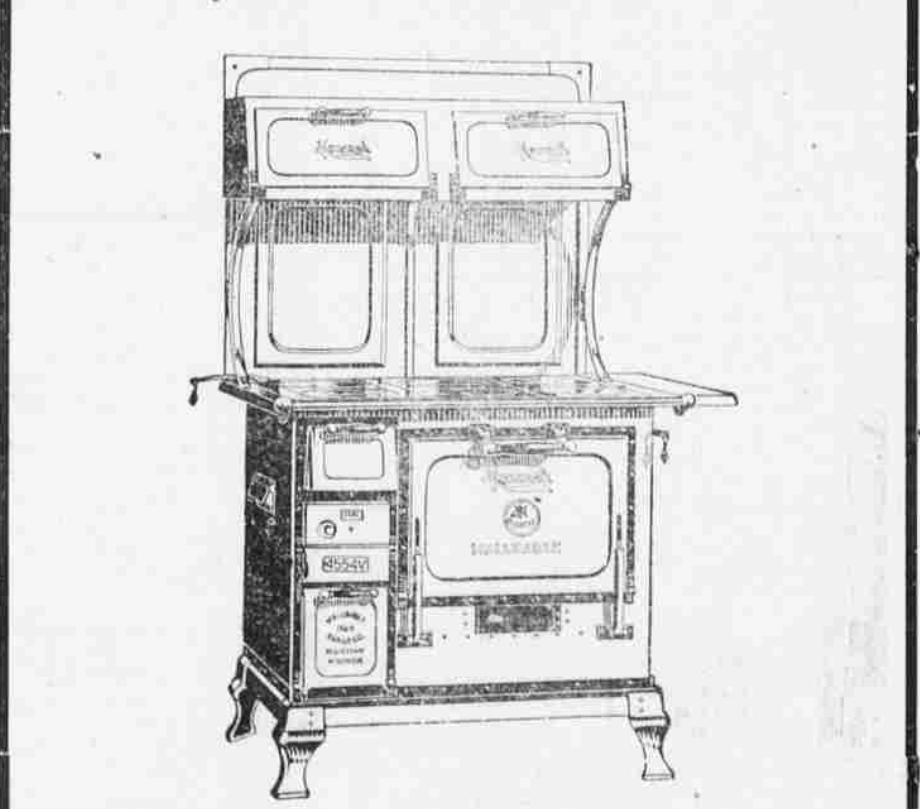
