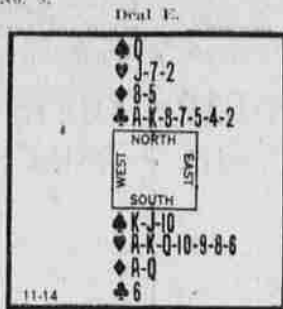

Bridge Pointers

Continuing the series of twenty-five Auction Bridge questions, we give today Deal E and question No. 5.



South is the Declarer, contract Hearts, West leads the King, East the Trey, and South the Six.

QUESTION No. 5. What card should Dummy lead to trick 2, and what card should Closed Hand play on that trick?

(Fill the blank before you read the answer that follows).

Answer Blank

5. To trick 2, Dummy should lead _____ and Closed Hand should play _____.

The Answer

5. Dummy should lead the Deuce of Clubs and Closed Hand should play any one of his trumps except the Six.

The idea of this play is to establish Dummy's Club and give Closed Hand four discards enabling him to get rid of his three Spades and the Queen of Diamonds. As the hand stands it would be very simple for Declarer to exhaust the adverse trumps, putting Dummy in on the third round, lead his good Club, discarding on it the Queen of Diamonds from Closed Hand then lead a Spade from Dummy and show down for a Small Slam; but why be satisfied with a Small Slam when a Grand Slam is within easy reach?

It would be dangerous for Dummy to lead his Ace of Clubs to the second trick as it might be ruffed by either adversary. (West's Club lead may have been either from four cards or a singleton), but by leading a small Club and ruffing with any trump but the Six, the adverse Clubs are reduced to a maximum of two, even if they are in one hand.

To trick 4 the high trump would be led from Closed Hand; and to trick 5 another trump which would be overtaken in Dummy (Dummy has two trump entries as Closed Hand has retained the Six of trumps). Dummy then would lead a second small Club which must reduce the adverse Clubs to one. Closed Hand would trump again (not with the Six) and give Dummy in for the third time. Dummy now has four good Clubs, Closed Hand makes four discards and a Grand Slam is assured.

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MENUS

BREAKFAST—Scrambled eggs with lemon, cereal, cream, creamed eggs on toast, extra toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Beef broth with noodles, open cottage cheese sandwiches, steamed carrot pudding, milk tea.

DINNER—Pork tenderloin with mince, cranberry sauce, cabbage, celery and pimento salad, apple charlotte, milk, coffee.

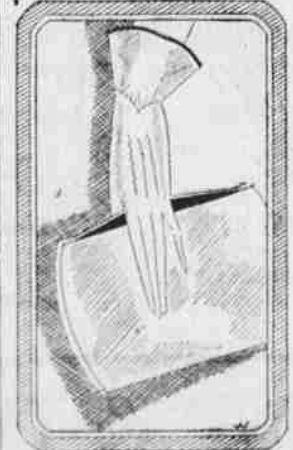
In place of time-honored apple sauce, cranberry sauce is served with the pork and apples used as dessert. Cranberries are especially good with this particular way of cooking the meat. The addition of onions to the dish makes a tart and highly flavored sauce desirable.

Pork Tenderloin With Onions

One or 2 medium sized tenderloins, onions, crackers, salt and pepper, butter, 1/2 to 1 cup boiling water.

A small family will need one strip of tenderloin while of course a large one will need two.

Cut meat lengthwise through the center with a sharp knife. Pull apart until almost split in two. If one tenderloin is used, cut crosswise through the center. Put one-half, split side up, in a roaster. Cover with a thick layer of thinly
