HOOVER PLAN MAY PREVENT ANY PANICS (Continued from Page 1) The next four years that a construction program more prudently be administered in time of plenty against the lean year that is to come. What Is Involved— "This involves simply the provision of the necessary funds or credit to be released when indexes still indicate the need and such designation of projects as may commend itself to the authority concerned." Governor Drimmer told the governors that an infringement of legislative prerogatives was contemplated, because no project could be carried out except as the feasibility was first proved, although the capability of the construction program within defined limits could be accelerated or retarded in synchronism with national and local needs. A Public Insurance— "Continuation of such a construction reserve" be continued, "to one of

the best forms of insurance against the panics of our past. It may not be a cure-all but it certainly will alleviate our ills. In some measure it is possible to do for employment what the Federal Reserve System has done for finance and with equal advantage to the country as a whole. "Picture the approach of an economic crisis with unemployment threatening in every hand. The release of three billions in construction contracts by public and quasi-public authorities would remedy or ameliorate the situation in the building of an eye. Federal industries are already becoming available that remove the problem from the domain of speculation or opinion and place the need upon a basis of simple facts. No Centralization— "No centralization of authority is proposed, but merely the creation of a condition by concerted action that shall make possible a remedy that will appeal persuasively to all. Follow the flow of those three billions to the contractor, to the laborer, to the material men, to the factory, to the factory employees, to the merchant, to the farmer. It goes like the house that Jack built and un-employment is at an end".

Find Baby's Body; Hunt For Mother

HOUSTON, Tex., Nov. 21 (AP)—The theory that the mother of an unidentified murdered baby also met death at the hands of a fiend was advanced here today when police records failed to show a report of a missing infant. The baby's mutilated body, which had been stuffed into a hard can, was found in a lonely gulch near here yesterday. The nine-months-old girl had been stabbed and shot and the body dismembered. Police believed the backshot charge which probably caused her death, also killed her mother, and that some neighborhood in the vicinity of the gruesome find may yield another body.

SUSPECT ARRESTED

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 21 (AP)—Woodford Childress, 25, was arrested by request of Santa Barbara police who charged him and an unidentified partner with fraudulently obtaining \$50,000 worth of securities from Mrs. Helen K. O'Quinn there. The woman, widow of a wealthy Oregon lumberman, reported she had turned the securities over to the men, who were said to have sold them.

Germans Reduce Debt to America

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21 (AP)—Germany reduced the claims of the United States for reimbursement of the cost of maintenance of the army of occupation on the Rhine river by \$22,558,471 during the fiscal year ending June 30, leaving due \$219,582,775. Major General Roderick L. Carmichael, chief of finance, reported today to Secretary of War Davis, that Germany made two payments, the first of \$6,919,549 and the second of \$15,637,926 and was allowed a credit of \$750.

RADIOMAN ELECTROCUTED

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Nov. 21 (AP)—Joseph Newton Smith Jr., 28, chief radioman stationed at the Cholla Heights naval radio station, was killed by an electric shock while on watch. Officials said Smith, in making a test, led one of his instruments too close to a 11,000 volt carrier. The current jumped to the instrument, killing him.
