

Union Football Team Is Beaten At Enterprise

 UNION, Ore., (Special) — The Maroon and White football squad dropped another game Saturday when they were defeated by the Enterprise eleven on the latter's field by the score of 13 to 6. Union carried the ball over for a second touchdown but lost the count on a charge of holding by one of the interference runners. This completes the year's schedule with the exception of the Thanksgiving game with La Grande, which will be played on the Union field. Union High has won four games, lost three, and tied one out of the eight games played to date. A win from La Grande would give a very satisfactory percentage and a loss will leave the pigs balanced for the year's playing. Arrangements are being made to secure three outside men for officials as the game will no doubt be hard fought on both sides. Union is expecting a record attendance for this last encounter of the season.

The staff of the Union High school paper, the "U-H," is busy getting the first edition of the paper ready for the press. It is announced that the paper will be out this week and in the printer's hands. Miss LaVerne Clark, senior, is editor-in-chief for the school publication this year.

A check on the enrollment of the Union High school for this year show that 22 students are here in attendance who were enrolled in some other school last year. Students are here from Tulelake, La Grande, North Powder, Firth, Idaho, John Day, Catherine creek district, High Valley school, Haines, Hot Lake school, Drake, Pondera, and The Park. Some are attending school here because they have relatives in Union, but most of them in order to benefit by the variety of courses which are offered by this school. Besides these there are several outside students who have attended this school before.
