FILM STAR FACES LIQUOR CHARGES

Alma Rubens Accused of Being "Extremely Intoxicated" Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 22 (AP)—Alma Rubens, film star, accused of being "extremely intoxicated," and with using abusive language in an affidavit filed in the city prosecutor's office yesterday was preparing today to confer with her lawyer to protect her interests in this affair.

The affidavit filed by Mrs. W. N. Schoelwer, of Beverly Hills, upon which she obtained a complaint charging Miss Rubens' negro maid, Edna Clayton, with battery, also alleged that the screen actress threatened Mrs. Schoelwer with bodily harm following a collision between the two women's automobiles on November 8.

Collision Detailed—Miss Rubens' car, the affidavit stated, collided with the negro maid, and a chauffeur, collided with the plaintiff's car which was parked at the curb in front of the Teat-Art motion picture studio in Hollywood.

An argument ensued between Miss Rubens' employees and Mrs. Schoelwer and a friend, Mrs. W. G. Swenson, which was climaxed, the affidavit charges by the maid seizing Mrs. Schoelwer by the throat and beating her in the face with her fist.

Miss Rubens entered the picture, according to the affidavit, when she heard the argument and came out of the studio. Miss Rubens, the affidavit continued, was "extremely intoxicated" and told Mrs. Schoelwer that her maid "only done what she should have done. We are all God's children. There is no creed or color."

Says Star Drunk—"Hanging on the side of my car," the affidavit continued, "and smoking a cigarette, the film star said: 'Come in and see Harry Schoelwer. You're not going to get away until this thing is straightened out. You're trying to frame me.'"

By "leaning in the window of my car with her body wobbling about," Mrs. Schoelwer charged that Miss Rubens refused to let her leave, saying "not until you've settled" and using abusive language to the plaintiff.

The affidavit stated that Mrs. Swenson then accused Miss Rubens of being "drunk" whereupon the actress came around the car and said, "I'll smash your nose in." The argument was ended, the affidavit said, when a young woman came out of the studio and led the film star into the office.

After depositing bail for the release of her maid, Miss Rubens indignantly denied the drunkenness and abusive language charges made in the affidavit. She said she "went out of the studio to see what was wrong and do what I could to settle whatever dispute there was," but declared "I was not willing as they say."

"It is most amazing that they mentioned my name," the film actress declared. "I had nothing whatsoever to do with it. I absolutely deny being intoxicated or being abusive in front of the two women."

She said that the court would hear both sides of the story "if I'm going to be dragged into it just because I'm a motion picture actress."

OMAHA STILL ON GUARD
