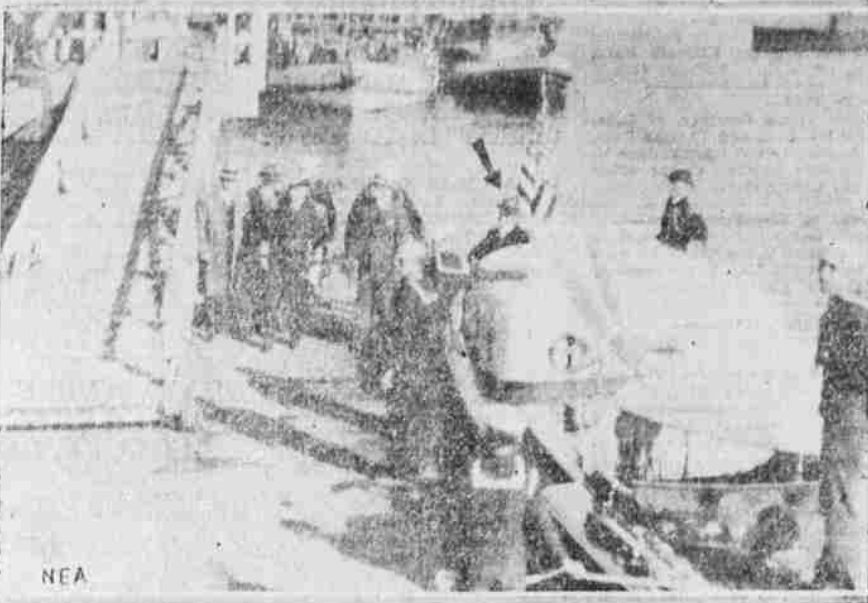

Forest Receipts Given Counties

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 22 (AP).—A total of \$171,622.19, representing the state's 25 per cent of national forest receipts collected by the federal government, was apportioned by Secretary of State House yesterday to the 33 Oregon counties that have national forest area within their borders. The government's receipts are from sales of land, rental and some other sources. The total apportionment goes to Klamath county, its share being \$17,645.20. Deschutes receives

\$14,244.65, Douglas \$10,162.75, Jackson, \$29,573.93, Lake, \$19,226.95, Lane \$16,436.53, Willamette \$10,932.18, and the other smaller amounts.

Marion county receives \$2,416.75 and Polk \$11.79.

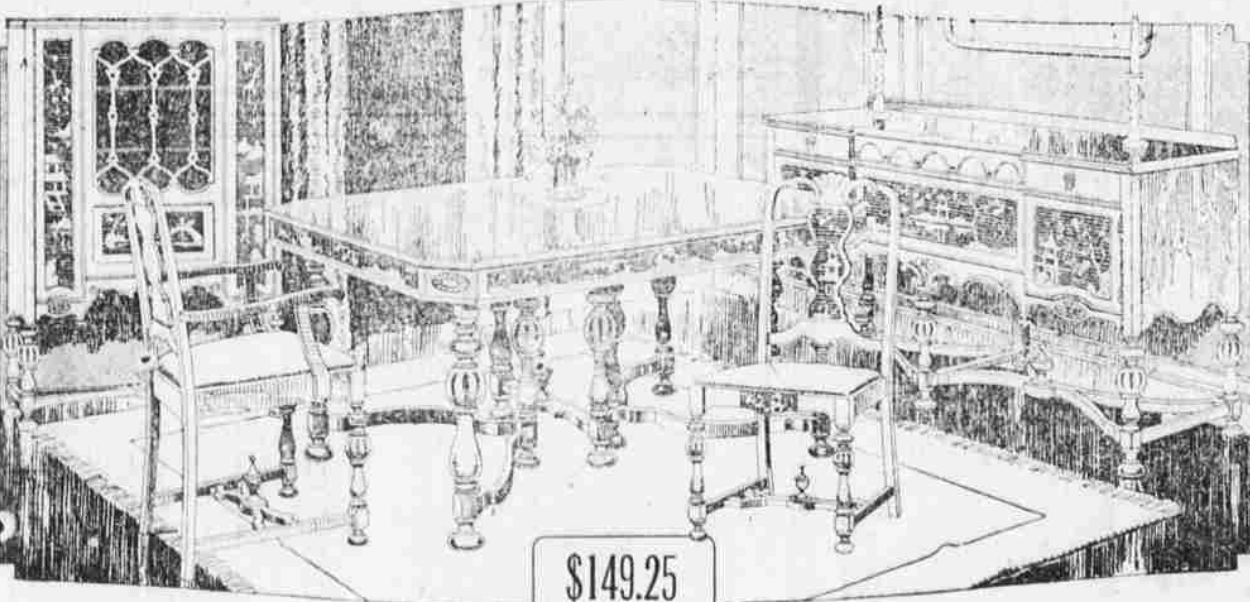
