OSLO, Norway, Nov. 22 (AP)—Dr. Fridtjof Nansen, polar explorer,

left today for Berlin to meet Dr. Hugo Eckener, builder of the Graf Zeppelin, regarding a north pole flight in 1930.

Dr. Nansen has been chairman

of a committee that has been planning for some time to make a flight from Europe to the United States by way of the arctic regions to determine the practicability of that route. It was announced on

October 13 at Koenigsberg, Ger., that the airship used on such a flight would be commanded by Captain Walter Bruns, secretary general of the Society of Arctic Research.

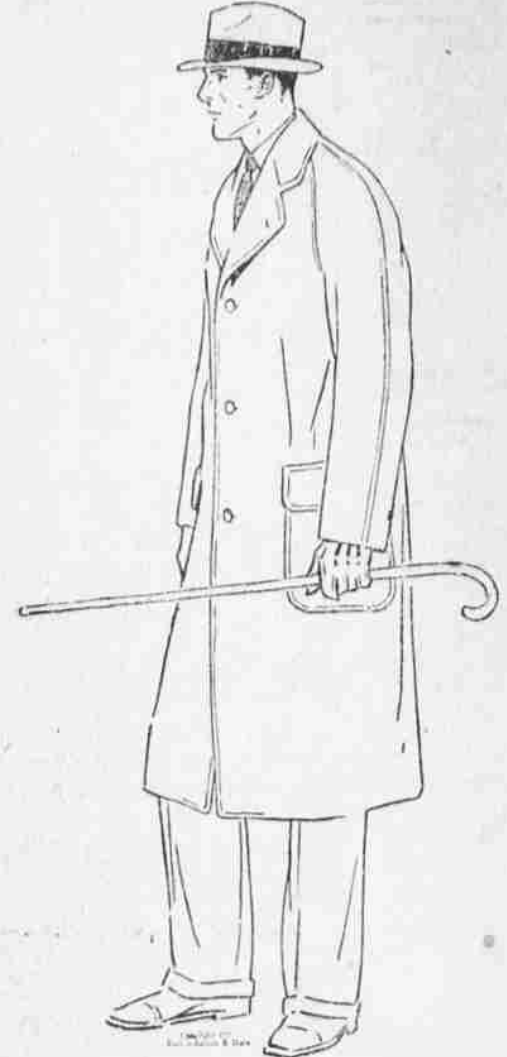
