Prince of Wales returned. The return of the Prince of Wales to the scene of an emergency would occupy only a few days. He could take royal air force planes to Cairo and thence follow the regular air routes to England. The prince has been a consistent user of planes in his many varied visits within England and Scotland.

The name of the lord chancellor, Lord Halsbury, formerly Sir Douglas Hogg, attorney general, has also been mentioned in connection with the emergency.
