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MENUS

BREAKFAST — Broiled prunes, cereal, cream, broiled cottage loaf, potatoe hashed in milk, crisp toast, grape jelly, milk, coffee.

DINNER — Rabbit chili con carne, mashed potatoes, cauliflower in cream sauce, head lettuce with French dressing, deep dish apple pie, milk, coffee.

Instead of beef, rabbit can be used for making "chili." Cook the rabbit in boiling water until the meat falls from the bones and then use it just as you would beef.

Cranberry Bread Pudding

Two cups cranberries, 1 cup water, 1 cup sugar, 2 to 4 cups coarse bread crumbs, 4 tablespoons melted butter, 1 tablespoon cinnamon, cream.

Add sugar and water to cranberries and bring slowly to the boiling point. Cook about ten minutes. Put a layer of crumbs in a well buttered baking dish and cover with a layer of cranberries. Sprinkle with butter and cinnamon. Continue layer for layer until all is used, making the last layer of crumbs. Sprinkle cream over the crumbs and bake 20 minutes in a moderately hot oven. Serve warm with top milk or whipped cream.

ROOKANE, Nov. 2 (AP)—Adoption of standard markings indicating the grade of all potatoes shipped from the northwest to markets of the world will be sought by the Pacific Northwest Potato Growers' Association, it was decided here just before the close of the association's three-day convention.

Representatives in congress from northwest states would be asked to seek proper legislation, it was said.

Bridge Pointers

CONTRACT BRIDGE

Following is the Contrast No Trump count referred to in yesterday's article:

Ace—4.
King—3.
Queen—2.
Jack—1.

Using the above count, bid as follows:

No Trump Bids

Dealer bids one No Trump with a hand that has three suits stopped and a count of 12.

Second Hand after Dealer's pass bids one No Trump with a hand that has three suits stopped and a count of 12.

Third Hand after two passes bids one No Trump with a hand that has three suits stopped and a count of 14.

Fourth Hand after three passes bids one No Trump with a hand that has three suits stopped and a count of 15.

A player in any position bids an original two No Trumps with four suits stopped and a count of 17, or with three suits stopped and a count of 19.

A player in any position bids three No Trumps originally with four suits stopped and a count of 21.

A player in any position bids four No Trumps originally with all four suits stopped twice and a count of 25, or if conservative 27.

No Trump Jumps

The partner of a Dealer or Second Hand who has bid one No Trump should jump to two with two Aces or a count of 8, and to three with a count of 12.

Partner of a Third or Fourth Hand that has bid one No Trump should jump to two with a count of 7, to three with a count of 10.

The partner of a player who has bid three No Trumps should jump to three with an Ace, a King and Queen of the same suit, or any

A Dealer or Second Hand who has bid one No Trump and has been jumped by his partner to two No Trumps should bid three if his original No Trump counted 15; but if it counted 12, 13 or 14, he should pass his partner's jump.

Third or Fourth Hand, who has bid one No Trump, should raise partner's jump to three if the original No Trump was bid with a count of 17, but not if it were a 14, 15 or 16.
