PHILIPPINES SUFFER

MANILA, Nov. 24 (AP)—Advices that several thousand persons have been made homeless and hundreds of homes destroyed in the typhoon which has raged through the south central part of the Philippine Archipelago for two days were received here today. No deaths have been reported.

A dispatch to the bulletin from Legaspi, Albay Province, said 700 persons were homeless and that four hundred dwellings and seven churches had been destroyed as the result of a 100 mile an hour gale. A big landslide at Mayon volcano, a short distance north of Legaspi, also was reported.

OFFERS PLAN TO CUT SCHOOL DEBT

Oregon Professor Speaks at Annual Conference Held in Eugene

EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 24 (AP)—Recommendations for curtailing heavy debts carried by schools of Oregon were offered by Dr. C. L. Huffaker, professor of school administration at the University of Oregon, in a talk before the second annual conference on school finance here today. Large debts under which schools in Oregon are laboring, as well as the type of handling which increased these debts, were brought out by Dr. Huffaker.

His survey of approximately 400 Oregon schools indicated that the state pays about \$2,000,000 annually for interest on bonded and floating school debts. He believed that better methods of handling and retiring debts could save the state about \$1,000,000 of this each year, while the added feature of issuing school bonds on a serial basis would save approximately \$1,200,000 more.

Greater efficiency and economy could be effected in Oregon schools through creation of larger school centers, both for elementary and high schools, and more careful attention to problems of organization to eliminate waste, declared P. L. Stetson, professor of secondary education at the University of Oregon.

Prof. Stetson's conclusions were given as the result of a survey of costs per capita of students in Oregon schools, which indicate that greater economy is effected in larger schools and one of the biggest handicaps experienced by Oregon schools is the fact that they are so small.

He found that the median cost in one-room schools for each pupil, annually, is \$30; in the two-room schools, \$40; school of 20 to 100 pupils, \$50; 100 to 150, \$42; 150 to 199, \$45; and above 200 pupils, \$42.
