Back-Tracking The Auto Trail

DETROIT (AP) — The title of "Father of the Automobile Industry," or builder of the first automobile, has been variously claimed and assumed, yet relatively few persons know who actually constructed the first vehicle even remotely resembling the present day automobile.

The names of Haynes, Duryea, Ford, Olds, Winton, Stearns and others come to mind when pioneers of the automobile industry are thought of, and by many Elwood Haynes is thought of as the builder of the first automobile.

History records, however, that the first motor-propelled vehicle that actually ran was the product of a French army officer, Captain Nicholas Joseph Cugnot, 1770.

Between 1769 and 1770 the French army officer built three automobiles, applying the newly invented steam engine to the function of propelling a road vehicle. Intended originally as a tractor for a third gun, the "car" proved clumsy and difficult to handle. It is a recorded fact, however, that the vehicle actually ran even though its speed was but two and a quarter miles an hour.

Thus it is that the automobile — if the clumsy contraption that intrigued the fancy of the French army officer may so be called — antedated the steam locomotive by some 26 years.

One of the earliest American efforts to perfect mechanical locomotion was that of Oliver Evans, of Philadelphia, who obtained a patent from the legislature of Maryland for the manufacture of "carriages" propelled by steam within that state.

Evans constructed a flatboat propelled by steam under command of the city of Philadelphia and then put forth the claim that he could apply the same principle to the propulsion of a land vehicle. He did this by mounting the flat

boat on a wagon, a steam engine atop the boat and a series of belts and gearing applying the power to the wheels. The "automobile" lasted long enough for a few minutes of demonstration and Evans then put the flatboat into the Schuylkill river and steamed away.

Another early pioneer in automobiles was Richard Trevithick, an Englishman, who constructed a steam car at Camborne, England. Like other early efforts it was a crude affair. Trevithick turned out a second machine in 1804. Some idea of the fore-runners of the present day modern automobile is given in the specifications of Trevithick's 1804 model. Propelled by a single cylinder in horizontal position, having a bore of 5 1/2 inches, the piston stroke was 30 inches. The power developed by five

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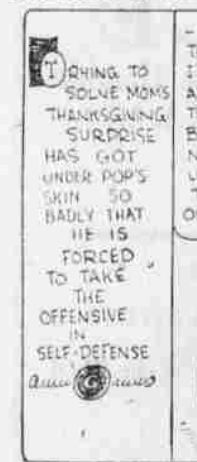
