BLINDING SNOWS FATAL TO FLIERS

Wintery Weather in Ohio Results in Five Deaths Over the Weekend

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Nov. 26 (AP)—Three aviators and two passengers were killed in weekend plane crashes, probable victims of blinding flurries in Ohio's first storm of the season.

Edwin H. Basset, a pilot for the Universal Air Lines of Chicago, Mrs. Basset and Glen R. Butt of Cleveland were found dead in the wreckage of an eight passenger monoplane near Edgerton, Ohio. The ill-fated landing ended Mr. and Mrs. Basset's plans to celebrate their eighth wedding anniversary in Chicago.

Boy trappers found the body of Tilden Johnson, a novice pilot, in a marsh near West Lebanon yesterday. Johnson, an employee of the Continental Air Lines, was en route to Cincinnati from Cleveland with 100 pounds of mail when his plane crashed.

Lawrence H. Garbison, a veteran pilot for the National Air Transport company, was found burned almost beyond recognition near Bristolville, Ohio, after a fire enveloped his plane. He was en route to Cleveland from Bellefonte, Pa.

The severity of the storm forced most air mail planes to remain in their hangars yesterday.

WALLA WALLA WINS SATURDAY, 25 TO 0

The final touchdown followed in short order. La Grande kicked off to the 20-yard line and Wa-Hi returned five yards. From the 25-yard line the Blue Devils marched straight down the field for a touchdown, aided by a 25-yard run through the blue and white team by Rutherford, fullback, and a 17-yard forward pass that placed the ball on La Grande's 11-yard line. A plunge through center netted six yards and Rutherford tore through the line again for the score. The extra point was also scored by Rutherford on a line plunge.

La Grande Threatens
The Blue Devils kicked off and La Grande put the ball in play on its own 35-yard line. Two passes failed and the Tigers took a five-yard penalty. Kaffer failed to gain and a 40-yard punt was reeled off. Walla Walla fumbled the ball and the Tigers recovered on the Wa-Hi 21-yard line. The visitors were offside on the first play, giving La Grande five yards on the penalty. After a one-yard gain, Patton finished off the drive for a first down. Faus and Kaffer advanced the ball to the five-yard line but there Walla Walla stiffened. The fourth down saw the Tigers attempting to pass but it

was knocked down. Wa-Hi punted to midfield. A pass to Newlin netted 11 yards and a first down, an attempted pass failed, and then a third pass to Wolfe netted 27 yards and put the ball on the 11-yard line. Two plays gave La Grande 2 yards and a Walla Walla penalty advanced the ball five more. With the ball on the four-yard line and four plays to put it over, only a few feet were gained on the next three and then Evans stepped back and tried for a field goal. His drop kick missed by a few feet.

Walla Walla took the ball on the 20-yard line and completed a 30-yard pass as the final period ended.

La Grande Scripted
In spite of the score, at times the play was fairly even with most of La Grande's yardage coming on forward passes. The Tigers made seven first downs to the Wa-Hi team's 12 and in yardage, La Grande gained 121 and Walla Walla 284.

La Grande played without the services of Stoddard, quarterback, and Kling, who regularly does most of the punting for the blue and white. The Tigers will end their season Thursday afternoon against Union.
