\$196,411 IN TAXES TURNED OVER LAST WEEK TO TREASURER

"Nothing so certain as death and taxes." And owners of property real or personal have been reminded during the early days of the month that the limit for paying without penalty was at hand. Since that date, delinquents have been calling at the county sheriff's office and paying the penalty. Because most people are interested in the things for which their money goes, the account of a turnover made last week by the sheriff's office to Florence Bacon, county treasurer, is interesting reading for all tax-payers.

The total amount of the turnover which included the last half of the taxes for 1927 was \$196,411.92. This amount was distributed as follows:

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A SEASONABLE RECIPE

Marble Angel Food Cake

(This might be more seasonable if eggs were not quite so high.)
11 egg whites, or 1½ cups.
4 teaspoon salt.
4 cup brandy flour, sifted 4 times.
2 tablespoons cocoa.
6 tablespoons flour, sifted 3 times.
1 teaspoon cream of tartar.
1½ cups sifted sugar.
½ teaspoon vanilla.
½ teaspoon lemon extract.
Add salt to egg whites and beat until foamy; then add cream of tartar and beat until dry, not stiff. Fold in the sugar carefully, one tablespoonful at a time. When all sugar is added divide into two equal parts. To one part fold in one-half cup flour and vanilla. To other part fold in cocoa, flour and lemon. Alternate dark and white in pan.
Bake one hour in a slow oven.

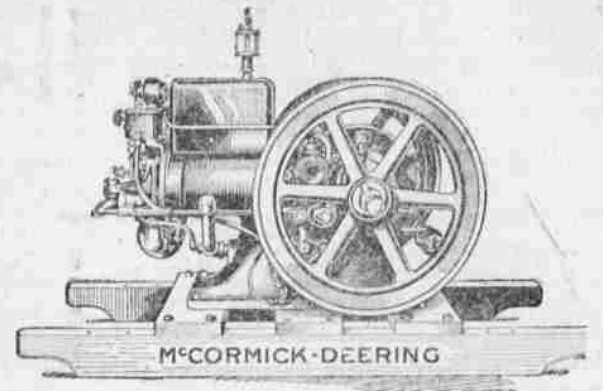
Move to La Grande—
