BELGIUM, HOLLAND FIGHTING OCEAN

Another Storm Appears to Be Brewing Today Over Western Europe

PARIS, Nov. 28 (AP)—With the lowlands of Belgium and Holland flooded another storm appeared to be brewing over Western Europe today.

Mountainous seas prevented pilots from reaching ships off the French coast with the result that many vessels were forced to remain in harbor. Havre, Bordeaux and other ports.

Received by a temporary lull in the storm, ten fishing boats went out to sea from Gaudouville, a little Mediterranean port. They were caught in a squall. Eight got back to port, but two sank and three men were drowned.

Sea Sweeps Land—In the low countries of Belgium and Holland, where dykes were down, the waters of the sea swept over wide stretches, demolishing houses, flooding fields and drowning livestock.

The death toll in Holland alone was 38, including 27 members of the crew of the Italian steamer Saffio, which went to pieces off Zandvoort almost in sight of the coast.

There were six feet of sea water in many places in Belgium and several weeks will be needed to drain off the flood. Small gaps in the dykes were being repaired and sandbags were being used to stem any new inland rush of the sea.

The Belgium towns of Termonde, Grembergen and Moerske were almost under water and provisions were becoming scarce for their beleaguered inhabitants. In Antwerp, restaurants and hotels were running low on food supplies. There was a famine of drinking water, due to breaking of pipes underlain by the flood, and potable water sold for four cents a quart while an exorbitant price was charged for mineral waters.

Countryside Inundated—Along the banks of the Scheldt from Antwerp to Vlissingen the countryside was under four to six feet of water. Six drownings were reported. Food was carried to those marooned.

High seas wrought thousands of dollars of damage to the Normandy coast resorts of Etretat, St. Valery-en-Caux, and Veules. The flood danger was looming in almost every region of France but particularly in the Eastern Pyrenees department and the Savoy region.

The Argentine schoolship Presidente Sarmiento, from the Isle of Wight, was prevented from entering the harbor of Boulogne-Sur-Mer and sought shelter on the British coast.

Beldin, also an uncle of Mr. Sutherland, will leave this evening. The funeral will be held Friday. Mr. Sutherland leaves to mourn his loss a wife and five children.

Influx of Salesmen—Just why on the day before Thanksgiving there should be such an influx of salesmen into La Grande is a question, but anyway they are here. The La Grande hotel which usually has an average of not more than two sample rooms in use a day, was faced with an emergency today when there were six salesmen with 11 trunks to be accommodated. There are three regular sample rooms in the hotel and to meet the extra demand three additional hotel rooms were furnished for sample rooms today. The large room on the corner of Fourth and Adams was devoted to that use. Salesmen with coats, suits, dresses, millinery, shoes and other items, are included among those who have come to town.

advised by special interests, in adopting the resolution the convention substituted "special interests" for "power interests" as contained in the original.

Active Opposition—The American Federation of Labor had always actively opposed the use of the schools and universities of the country for propaganda of any nature. The resolution adopted by the convention was in line with this policy.

It then resolved that the labor federation "go on record as unalterably opposed to all efforts of private and public service corporations and of real estate boards and other private corporations to inject covert propaganda into the public schools and universities."

It directed the federation's standing committee on education to continue its studies of text books used in its supported schools with three considerations, especially in mind and to forward their findings to the federation and affiliated unions. The resolution was adopted with only one dissenting vote.

Klamath Indian Shot Last Night Because of Girl—KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Nov. 28 (AP)—Valley "Buck" Pearson, husky young Klamath Indian, was shot dead on the main street of Chiniquin, Klamath reservation town, last night by Bill Thompson, elderly foreman of the Ball ranch, of Northern Klamath county. The shooting was witnessed by more than a score of Chiniquin citizens.

Thompson shot Pearson because of attentions the younger man had been paying to 16-year-old Alva Tice, whom Thompson had practically raised on the Ball ranch. Thompson had warned Pearson twice to stay away from the girl.

As Pearson fell after the shot, Thompson ran to a car nearby, threw in a revolver and pulled out a 20-30 rifle. "Don't any of you come near," he shouted to the gathering crowd. "If you do, you'll get the same dose Pearson did."

Thompson then jumped into a bright yellow coupe, driven by Ralph Tice, and drove out of Chiniquin at a high rate of speed. Word reached Chiniquin today that he told Mrs. Alva Tice that he would surrender to officers tomorrow.
