TIGER MACHINE DEFEATS UNION ELEVEN, 12 TO 0

disqualified for unnecessary roughness. The game ended with Union making a first down deep in their own territory.

Frequent Penalties
The game was rough throughout with frequent penalties and some injuries. Captain Ketter was knocked out early in the game and was carried from the field. Baker was also injured. Of the yardage gained on penalties, La Grande had 75 and Union 52. The La Grande line at times was invincible with Gutman playing like an expert and his mates following his lead. Ketter, Evans and Foss rolled up a lot of yardage and Newlin, on the receiving end of several passes, accounted for some large gains.

On first downs, La Grande led with 15 to Union's 10. The Tigers climbed up 362 from all sources while the Union total was 175. The Tigers' passing attack and their scoring end runs accounted for most of the late and white victories. The La Grande backfield attempted 22 passes and an even 11 of them were successful. In addition, two Union passes were intercepted.

La Grande's Record
A large crowd witnessed the game, which was played under almost ideal weather conditions. Concluding the season La Grande has victories over Union, Baker, Wallawa, Enterprise and Cove, a tie with Pendleton, and defeats from Milford-Freswater and Walla Walla.

The La Grande team as a whole played aggressive ball yesterday, each member working in strong fashion in his place in the Tiger machine. Norman King, one of the players who were unable to enter the game because of injuries, wrote a letter of encouragement to the team, winding up with "I want you fellows to get mad and go. Tear 'em up."

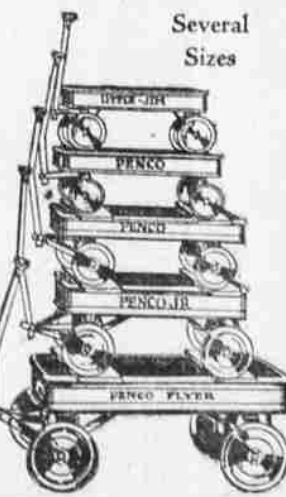

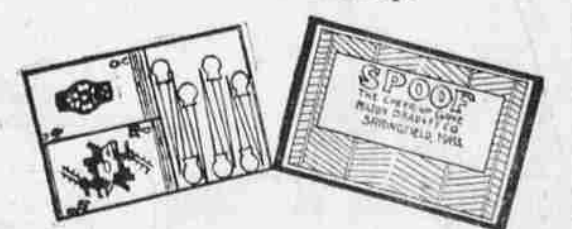
