## MENUS

**By Sister Mary**  
**BREAKFAST**—Chilled prune and lemon juice, cereal, cream, poached eggs on graham toast, milk, coffee.

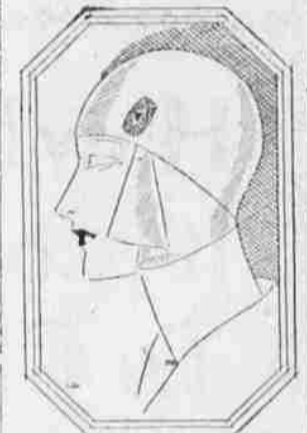
**LUNCHEON**—Cream of celery soup, croissants, open salmon sandwiches, dried apricot jelly, tea.

**DINNER**—Braised codfish steaks with lemon butter, rice, potatoes, kale in cream sauce, tomato and pineapple salad, cherry puff pudding, milk, coffee.

To make the lemon butter which is spread over the fish before serving, cream 4 tablespoon butter. Add 1/2 teaspoon salt and 1/2 teaspoon pepper and 1 tablespoon minced parsley. Then add very slowly 1 scant tablespoon lemon juice and spread immediately over fish. The heat of the fish melts the butter and absorbs the mixture.

**Dried Apricot Jelly**  
 Two cups stewed dried apricots rubbed through a sieve, 1 tablespoon granulated gelatin, 2 tablespoons cold water, 1 cup sugar, 1/2 cup boiling water, 1/2 cup sugar, 2 bananas.

It will take about 1/2 pound of apricots before soaking and stewing to make two cups of fruit with its juice when sifted. Soften gelatin in cold water for five minutes. Add sugar and boiling water to softened gelatin and stir until dissolved. Add orange juice and apricot puree. Let stand until beginning to thicken and then arrange alternate layers of sliced

## First Snow At Wallowa Comes Early In Week

 WALLOWA, Ore. (Special)—Very mild weather has prevailed in this part of the country. Much of the past week has been fair with but little freezing at nights. However, with the first of the week stormy conditions came again, with some rain and a light fall of snow on Monday night. It is still quite warm and unless the weather should become colder the snow now on the ground will soon melt. Practically all of the stock are still on pasture yet, and doing quite well in most instances. E. H. and Glenn Sherod, Oscar Maxwell and other stockmen in this end of the valley have been busy recently gathering some of their cattle from the summer ranges. Some plowing is still being done in parts of the county, but farmers in the dry farming sections have not been able to do much plowing, due to the extreme dryness of the ground for much of the fall, and following the recent moisture which has soaked into the ground some, the ground on the north slopes has held some frost, making it difficult to plow in these places.

Winter wheat crops over the country are looking quite good, with many of the "spotted" places in the fields greening up considerably since the moisture has been sufficient to start the seed which did not come earlier because of the dry weather.

Stock water conditions are improving, with wells and spring bananas and jelly in a mold first dipped in cold water. Let stand several hours to chill and become firm. Unmold and serve with or without a garnish of whipped cream.

Dried peaches could be used in place of apricots.
