Members of La Grande's national guard company have a chance to win \$120 for their 1929 Camp Clatsop mess fund and there are no strings attached to the prize, according to announcement made here this week. All it takes for Company E, 186th Infantry, to secure the bonus is to have 100 per cent attendance for the next three drills. Any member of the company who fails to attend these drills will be depriving 40 national guardsmen of juicy drusticks with strawberries and cream for desert at the encampment next June and besides that they will have to render the "belt gauntlet" both ways—by order of the committee—officers have learned.

The annual inventory of all government equipment that is charged to the company has been completed by Captain E. W. Ely and Supply Sergeant Orson J. Brandt, and a few items of clothing were reported missing.

Last week Private Sam Walker took competitive examination, given at Portland, for a much coveted appointment to West Point. The report has not yet been received. This is the 12th consecutive month that the La Grande company has been rated in Class A and during June the company topped the list for attendance of all rifle companies in Oregon.

first down by inches and the Army took the ball as the period ended, with the ball in Army's possession on its own 5 yard line.

On a fake pass Timberlake plunged five yards at center and then gained another yard. Cagle slipped around right end for a first down on Army's 23-yard line.

An Army fumble was recovered for a three yard loss. Gibber was thrown for a 2 yard loss by Heinicke. Cagle slipped off right tackle for six yards. Timberlake kicked to Wilton on Stanford's 30 yard line and he ran it back to the 42 yard line.

Army Given Ball.—The ball was given to Army when a Stanford pass struck an ineligible man before it was caught by Sims. Cagle plunged two yards through center. Cagle passed to Timberlake for a first down on Stanford's 35 yard line. Timberlake bucked out of bounds without gain.

Cagle failed to gain on a sprint around Stanford's right end and Paul was hurt on the play. Post was carried off the field, Driscoll taking his place. Cagle's pass was grounded. Cagle passed to Carlson on Stanford's 8 yard line.
