# News of the Churches

## Storm Prevents Pulpit Exchange Sunday Morning

### Presbyterians La Grande And Pendleton Forced to Give Up Plans As First Announced

Several of the churches of La Grande are announcing features of special importance and interest at some service tomorrow. One, that promised to be most unusual, was announced Friday in that the pastors and choir of the Pendleton and La Grande Presbyterian churches would exchange on Sunday morning, but the snow storm this morning forced the postponement of this. Instead, the Rev. J. George Wark will preach here as usual and the Rev. George Bruce will remain in his Pendleton pulpit.
