BREAKFAST—Bananas, cereal cooked with raisins, cream, lamb cutlets with tomato sauce, graham muffins, milk, coffee.
LUNCHEON—Salsify chowder, fruit salad, toasted graham muffins, milk, tea.

DINNER—Roiled flank steak, mashed potatoes, creamed turnips, pickled beets, grape pudding, milk, coffee.

While some families may find this breakfast too hearty, others will welcome the extra dish of lamb cutlets with tomato sauce.

Choose a chunky cut of lamb and put lean meat with a little fat through the food chopper. Add half the volume in dried bread crumbs. Mix thoroughly and stir in an unbeaten egg. Add milk to make quite moist. Shape into small flat cakes and pan-broil. Serve on a hot platter surrounded by sauce and garnish with parsley. The meat should be chopped and combined with bread crumbs the night before.

Salsify Chowder
Eight roots of salsify, 1-3 cup lentils, 3 potatoes, 2 cups milk, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 onion, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 1/2 teaspoon celery salt, 1 egg, soda milk crackers.

Scrape salsify and cut in slices crosswise. Drop into cold water to which vinegar has been added to prevent discoloration. Soak lentils over night in cold water to cover. In the morning drain and put into a deep sauce pan. Add 2 cups of cold water and bring to the boiling point. Simmer one hour and add onion finely minced and prepared butter. Cook, covered, an hour longer. Add potatoes pared and cut in dice and cook 45 minutes or until vegetables are tender.
