All bids shall be in the hands of the Commissioners not later than 5 P. M., December 11th, 1928. All bids submitted shall be accompanied by Cash, Certified Check or Bladders Bond in the sum equal to Five per cent of the total amount of the bid submitted. The successful contractor will be required to furnish the County Commissioners a Surety Bond equal to 100 per cent of the contract cost, to insure the completion of the contract and to indemnify the County against labor or material liens.
