Christmas Turk Market Will Be Lighter, Report

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 2 (AP)—Indications are that the Christmas turkey market will be lighter than that for Thanksgiving. Dressed turkey No. 1 grade has dropped in price to a present quotation of 22 to 23c per pound. Geese are

offered at 17 to 18 cents today. Quality of turkey offerings remains high. Ten thousand turkeys are to be shipped east this week from Umatilla county. Cranberries were offered at \$6 to \$6.50 a box for western variety and \$22 a barrel for Eastern Home. Citrus fruits remain fairly steady with navel oranges at \$1.50 to \$6. Other fruits and vegetables steady.

Call Money Is Marked Up To 9 In Wall Street

NEW YORK, Dec. 2 (AP)—Heavy liquidation for both accounts brought about a sharp reaction in prices in today's stock market. Net losses of 1 to 4 points were distributed over a broad list of rails and industrials with a score or more high priced issues down 5 to nearly 15 points. Trading showed a further contraction in volume. Call money renewed at 8 per cent and advanced to 9 as banks called \$25,000,000 in loans. Because of the necessity of strengthening their reserve positions, banks had a relatively small supply of funds.

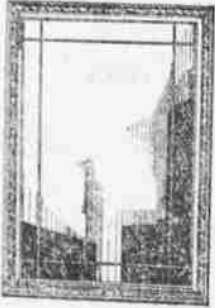
